he Iowa Department of Revenue had decided that pumpkins were used primarily for Halloween decorations, not food, and should be taxed. "We made the change because we wanted the sales tax law to match what we thought the predominant use was," the department's spokeswoman said. "We thought the predominant use was for decorations or jack-o'-lanterns."

However, Iowa pumpkin growers reacted negatively to the new policy, anticipating a cut in their profits. On Wednesday, Gov. Chet Culver ordered the department to "do the common sense thing" and offer refunds to anyone affected by the "ridiculous" policy.

"I don't mind paying taxes, but let's get real, here people," said Bob Kautz, owner of a pumpkin patch in Buffalo, just west of Davenport.
