Unlike the column, the cartoon and the letters to the editor, editorials do not have names attached to them. This is because they are written from the position of the board and do not reflect the individual stance of the writer.

The editorial board meets three times a week for an hour and a half at a time to brainstorm ideas and to debate and vote on what stance it will choose to champion. After the stance is selected, members of the board volunteer to write editorials from the stance that the board voted to take.

The end result of the process is the editorials that you read and enjoy.
