

TEARING DOWN THE WALLS

Construction workers continue the demolition of Venable Hall on Tuesday afternoon. The building served as the campus's main chemistry center since its construction in 1925. It was named after Francis Preston Venable, a professor of chemistry and president of the University from 1900 to 1913. He was also the first faculty member to hold a Ph.D. The building is being torn down in order to clear the way for new facilities.

DISTRICTING

Elementary is the highest in the district with about 70 percent. The registration process for parents who want their children to attend Hillsborough Elementary might include indicators of income in order to balance out the socioeconomic gap with the district's other schools. Four other Hillsborough Elementary parents asked the board to reconsider its decision that might oust current students. Ashley Ward, who has had children at Hillsborough Elementary for seven years and might face reassignment now, emphasized the impact the date of notification will have on year-round parents. The registration process for the next school year begins on Jan. 31 and closes on March 21. Preliminary plans show that parents will be notified by April 30 of their application status. "One of the most profound impacts is the doubling of summer care that we would be required to find and finance at the last minute," Ward said. Others said they wanted to maintain the relationships among students and parents at the school. "Please do not divide our HES community any more than you already have," said Jackie Mignosa, whose children are not affected by the new application process. "If your No. 1 goal is to improve (socioeconomic status), that has to be a long-term goal, not an overnight goal."

ALDERMEN

might become the first to fall under a new affordable housing regulation passed at Tuesday's meeting. The board passed an ordinance allowing developers to make a payment toward an affordable housing fund instead of building affordable units on their sites, after an impassioned plea from Orange Community Housing and Land Trust Executive Director Robert Dowling in favor of the proposal. The measure is intended to provide financial support to the institution without flooding the affordable housing market, Dowling said. Ripperton said he would consider providing such a payment. But despite all the wrangling throughout the more than three-hour meeting, Buddy Kelly, who lives next door to the site, said any change would be an improvement. The spot has been dormant since a former hardware store closed. "It's been an eyesore and a nuisance," Kelly said. "Anything's better than a trash-strewn vacant lot."

RUBY DEE

Dee explained that her criticism of certain forms of media does not extend to censorship in any form. "I like the idea of freedom of expression," Dee said. "I like the idea of innovation. ... There's a freedom in the arts." Junior Sarah Al-Zoubi was announced as the 2008 winner of the Martin Luther King Jr. Scholarship. "As a performer of spoken word, I felt what she said was truly inspirational and just confronted a lot of aspects of society," Al-Zoubi said. Although she was critical of certain forms of storytelling, Dee presented her messages with powerful stories. "I envision that we're going to have roomfuls of children and young people," Dee said. "And we're going to tell the children of the story of the Montgomery Bus Boycott, and they're going to hear how America came to be the most just, civilized, fair, honest, God-fearing country on the face of this earth."
