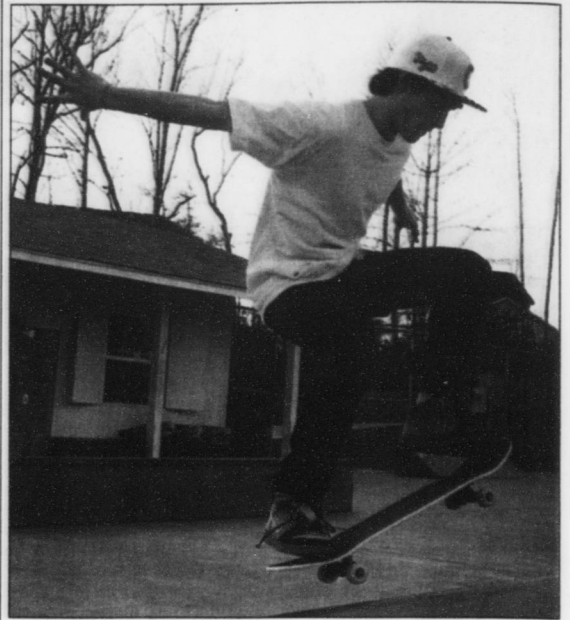
Experimental film screening:

Farrington, who faces felony counts of possession and possession with intent to sell or distribute marijuana and a misdemeanor count of possession of drug paraphernalia, was taken to Orange County Jail in lieu of \$15,000 bail pending a date in Hillsborough's court of first appearance later Wednesday.

■ A car driven by Shirley Steinkamp Durham, 85, of 213 Edisto Court, struck a pedestrian crossing Banks Drive between the

Timberlyne Movie Theater and the Food Lion, according to Chapel Hill police reports.

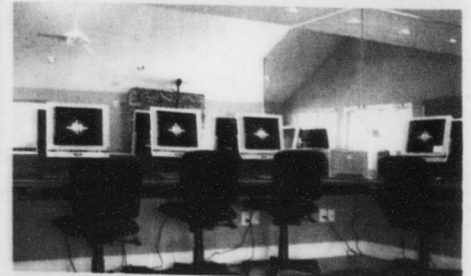
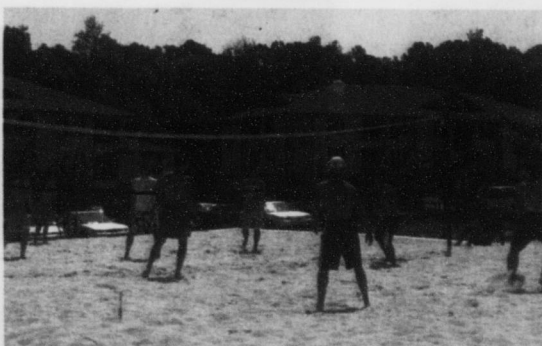
Durham was blinded by sunlight shining over the top of the movie theater and didn't see the pedestrian, who pushed another pedestrian out of the car's path, reports state.
