Mississippi lawmakers try to trim fat

hree Mississippi legislators have introduced a bill that would make it illegal for restaurants to serve obese customers, USA Today reported.

"Any food establishment to which this section applies shall not be allowed to serve food to any person who is obese," the bill reads in part.

The State Department of Health would be responsible for determining the obesity benchmark and for enforcing the law.

Under the proposal, health inspectors would be allowed to take away the permit from any restaurant that repeatedly feeds extremely overweight customers.

About two-thirds of Mississippians are overweight or obese, according to a recent analysis of federal health data.

Remember your course numbers. The hardest part of the application is listing and remembering all of your course numbers, advisers say.

I Take care of transfer credits. If you have credits from study abroad or other colleges and universities that have

not shown up on your record, send your transcripts with your application Meet with your adviser.

If you haven't met with your adviser to ensure that you are taking the right classes, schedule an appointment with senior advisers immediately.

Check with your profes-sional school. Seniors in the fessional schools should talk to their advisers about the school's specific deadlines and requireme nts


