For personal contact

Each residence hall has a resident adviser for every floor. In the high-rise South Campus buildings, most floors house two RAs.

If you have a problem during the day, it's best to seek out your floor RA.

Your RA can get in touch with the community director and the appropriate group for your problem.

Every night, an RA is on call for each community.

■ If you have a problem at night, the RA on-call number should be posted on each floor's bulletin board. It's also available at the front desk

is willing to fix nearly any problem with your suite, there are some things to think about before you

ask for help.

The housing department includes in its expectations of residents that each room be clean. So if you're making a request for your broken air conditioner, it's a good idea to make sure a pathway is cleared.

■ Residents are responsible for their guests. If you have guests, be sure they know the rules so that ifthere's a problem, you aren't stuck dealing with the consequences of their actions.


Know the rules before you call. You can access all of the housing departments rules, regulations and codes of conduct at housing. unc.edu/policies/expectations_
