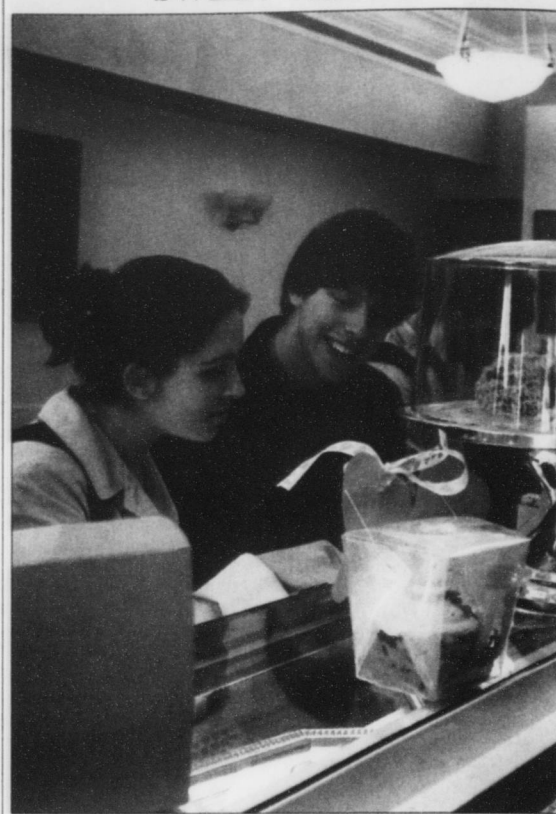

■ Just before 5 a.m. on Valentine's Day, Chapel Hill police arrested Evan Derosé Henage for assault on a female, a misdemeanor, and assault by strangulation, a felony, according to Chapel Hill police reports.

The arrest of Henage, 18, of 305 Woodhaven Road, came about two hours after he was released from his first arrest of the day, a charge of underage possession of alcohol, for which he was nabbed at 12:23 that morning, reports state.

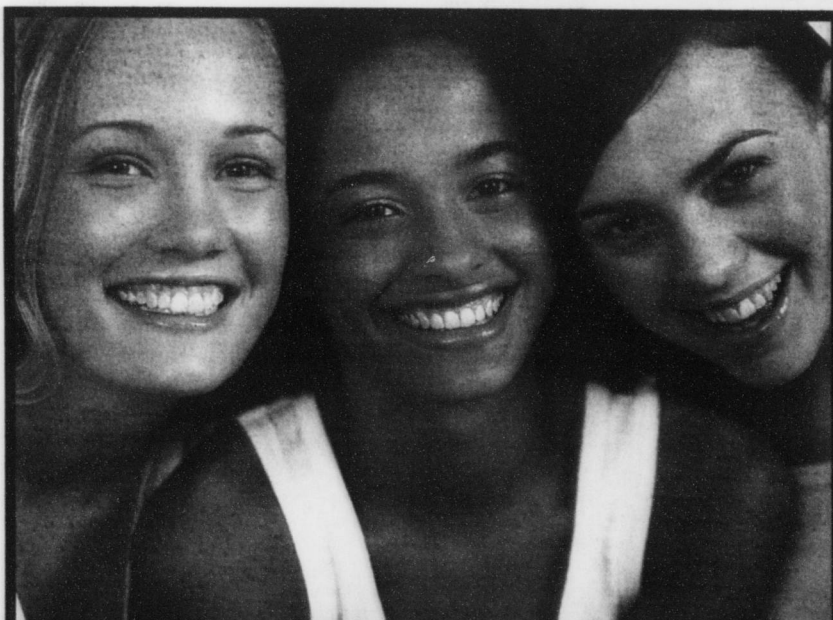
Henage had registered a 0.06 blood alcohol content and was released along with Jeremy Scott Nichols, 20, of 112 Woodbridge Lane, who was charged with driv-

ing while impaired, violating conditions of a provisional license and driving with a suspended license, according to reports.

For the assault charges, Henage was taken to Orange County Jail in lieu of \$5,000 bond pending a hearing later that day, reports state.
