Couple risks prison for Thin Mints

A group of Colorado Girl Scouts were scammed with a counterfeit \$100 bill used to purchase two boxes of the famous cookies.

"A young couple came and purchased two boxes of cookies and left with \$93.50 in change," said Jil Hennessey-Seabolt, the troop's cookie director. "They had two boxes of our cookies and a whole bunch of free, really good, spendable money."

Hennessey-Seabolt said the con artists cost the girls a day's worth of profit. "This has taught me to be more careful," Rowan Seabolt, 12, said. "I am not going to check every single bill, but I am going to watch out for suspicious behavior."

An anonymous donor later gave the girls \$100 to make up for their losses.

NOTED. Georgia police are investigating taxi drivers who deliver beer instead of passengers, The Atlanta Journal-Constitution reported.

Officer Jose Ayala said police conducting a sting operation placed calls requesting beer to taxi company dispatchers. Three drivers were arrested for selling alcohol without a license. Ayala said the drivers would go to a liquor store, pay about \$20 for beer, then charge customers \$30 or \$40.

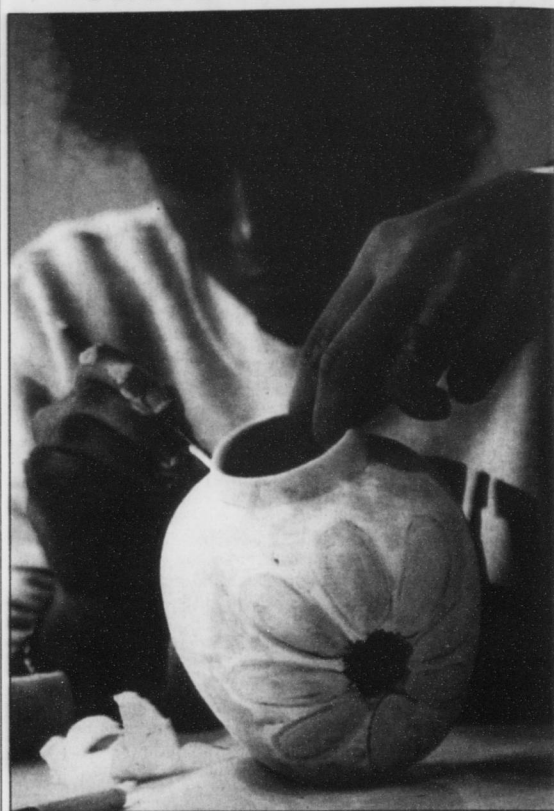
