A New York man in a tiff with his girlfriend clung to her roof and punched her through the car window as she drove more than a mile on a busy road and hit several other cars, police said. Both were hurt in the incident and were arrested, police Sgt. Manfredo Figueroa said.

The man, William Kremer, reportedly jumped onto the car and held on as girlfriend Stacey Sperrazza wove down the road with the car's air bag inflated.

She eventually stopped the car and hit him with it, police said.

Sperrazza, 37, of Stony Point, was arrested on a felony charge of reckless endangerment. Kremer, 42, of Haverstraw, was arrested on a misdemeanor assault charge.
