"Did you know before the sit-in if they were going to serve you?" one student asked.

"I knew I was going to win" McCain answered. "The only thing

I didn't know was when." Fourth-grader Yuma Kobayashi said he enjoyed hearing McCain.

"If I see somebody saying some-body can't do something, I can tell

them to stop," Kobayashi said. The civil rights movement is still progress today, McCain said.

He said he looks at the issues on a local basis now. He is involved with registering voters, mentoring students and working to establish equality in education.

"I pick my fights more," McCain said. "They are more strategic."

He said that he enjoys speaking to the younger generation and that they surprise him with their enthusiasm.
