North Carolina (27-2) found ways to hide all of Duke's talent in dealing the Blue Devils their worst loss since 1993. It was also the most lopsided UNC victory over Duke since 1982.

From the opening whistle, UNC took Duke out of its rhythm. Duke was held to 30 percent shooting and turned the ball over a season-high 27 times. The Blue Devils (21-8, 10-4 ACC) also finished 0-12 from 3-point range, ending a 109-game

streak with at least one 3-pointer. "They played much more like a team - they had 21 assists; we had 12," Duke coach Joanne McCallie said. "They played their game, and we didn't fight hard enough to play ours. And that's a problem.

On the offensive end, the Tar Heels spread the ball around. Larkins, Pringle and DeGraffenreid tied for a team-high 14 points, and junior Rashanda McCants added 12. Six other Tar Heels found the scoring column en route to the win.

The undefeated conference regular season is the eighth in ACC history, the most recent by Duke

Sunday's game marked not only the last home game for seniors Pringle, Larkins and Meghan Austin but also the last game played in Carmichael Auditorium for two years. The arena will undergo renovations next year. And Pringle said

the win was a sweet send-off. "To be 14-0 for the first time in school history — to be me and Erlana and Meghan's senior sea-- for this to be the last game in Carmichael for the next two years — I think just with all that combined, it's just a really happy moment," she said. "It's almost too good to put into words."

"Usually post players have a lot of points and rebounds," UNC coach Sylvia Hatchell said. "But as far as ists and steals and all that, I don't think many post players in the country have numbers like that. In fact, I

know they don't."

Larkins even corrected her one weakness this season - foul shooting. Only a 57.1 percent shooter entering the evening, she made 6of-8 from the charity stripe.
As if the team needed any more

energy, fellow senior Meghan Austin made the most of her first career start. Even before the opening tip, Austin was jumping up and down to energize the crowd.

And just 32 seconds passed on the clock before Austin rotated into the lane to take a charge and electrify the arena.

"It just brought us to a different level; she was just excited, jumping around," Pringle said. "To see her take a charge just uplifted the rest of the team.

And no one was more enthusiastic than Austin.

Before the game I was like, just want to take a charge," she said. "Because I knew that would be something that the team always gets pumped up about. ... I just said in my mind before the game that I wanted to take a charge, so I did, and I was so excited."

With time winding down and the game no longer in doubt, the crowd vocally petitioned for Austin's return, chanting her name. She got her chance and made three free throws in the last minute.

"It was just awesome — it was the chance of a lifetime," Austin said. "To be out there with LaToya and Erlana, it was just so emotional that I couldn't help but be excited."


