Six North Carolina athletes were med conference champions Saturday flowing a weekend of ups and downs the Tar Heel track and field teams at e ACC Outdoor Champ

After a slow start on the competion's first day, the UNC women steadily crept up the standings to finish in third place. The men, on the other hand, were unable to hold their first place mark after day one and had fallen to fifth by the time action

A few Tar Heels took hold of their first ACC titles, whereas others used the weekend to add to their collec-

After beating out the field in the omen's 1,500 meter run, junior

Brie Felnagle shattered a 21-year-old Griffin Track record Saturday when she claimed first in the 5,000-meter run with a time of 16:22. Her time bested the record by more than 10 seconds and earned Felnagle her sixth career ACC championship.

On the men's side, freshman Charles Cox used a time of 45.95

seconds to win the men's 400-meter dash and his first taste of ACC

Other Tar Heels gained renown during the weekend by covering distance through the air. Freshman Patience Coleman surpassed a regional qualifying mark with her jump of 1.78 meters to take home her first ACC women's high jump title. Sophomore Donte Nall matched Coleman's feat for the

of the year. Freshmen Brian Moore and Walter Henning topped in the ranks in a pair of field contests for the Tar Heels. Moore garnered his first share of ACC gold with a 65.17 meter hurl of the javelin, and Henning turned a 68.71 meter hammer throw into the second ACC triumph of his young career.

The North Carolina men's and women's golf teams finished third and fifth in their respective ACC Tournaments

Junior Chase MacFarland shot a five-under 67 in the final round of the men's tournament Sunday, which took place at the Old North State Club in New London, to climb up the leaderboard four spots and fin-ish second overall. In the last round, MacFarland sank eight birdies but scrambled for three bogies. Freshman Kevin O'Connell fin-

ished in sixth place in the tourna-ment, shooting a six-under-par 210 for the weekend. The rest of the Tar Heels finished in 18th, 24th and 36th place, respectively.

UNC finished eight strokes behind tournament champions Florida State Seminoles, who won their first-ever men's golf conference championship with a 26-under-par combined score. The Tar Heels now must prepare


for the NCAA regional tournaments, which take place in May. The women's team finished strong but did not fare as well as their male counterparts. They shot 40-over-par

Junior Sydney Crane was the highest-placing Tar Heel at ninth place, shooting a six-over-par 222 for the tournament. Sophomore Kate Thomas finished not far behind after a three-under-par final round, tying her at 13th place at seven-

"We didn't play very well the first

day," coach Sally Austin said.
"However, we got better every
day. Our attitudes were good. Sydney
played really steady, and Kate
Thomas bounced back. There were a
lot of good things."
The Tar Heels finished 33 strokes
behind the Duke Blue Devils, who
won the tournament, along with a
Carlyle Cup point, with a seven-overpar overall performance.
The women's team now must look
forward to the NCAA regional tournaments, as well.

"We've got a couple weeks to get more prepared. We've got to play to our potential, but I think we're going to save our best for last."



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
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
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
