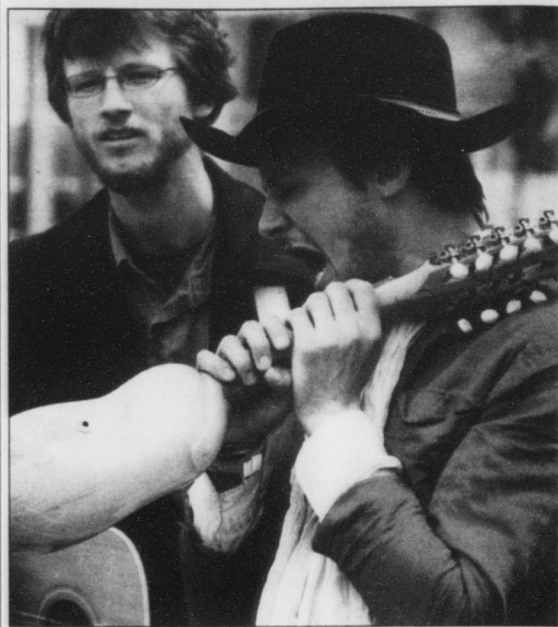

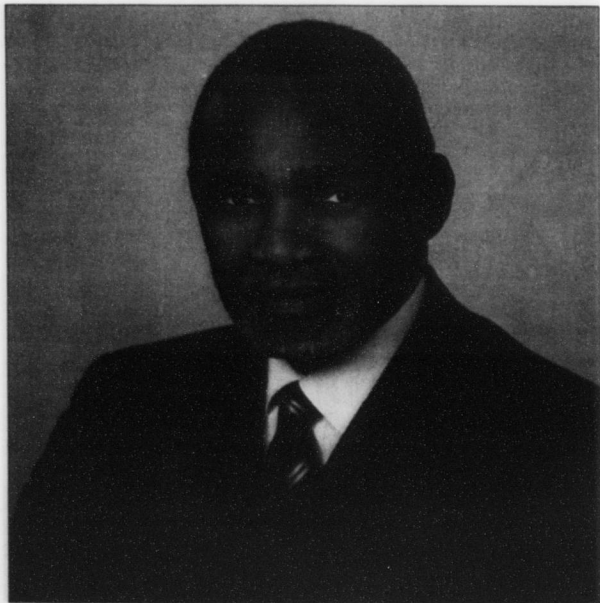
The Acura is valued at \$8,000, according to reports.

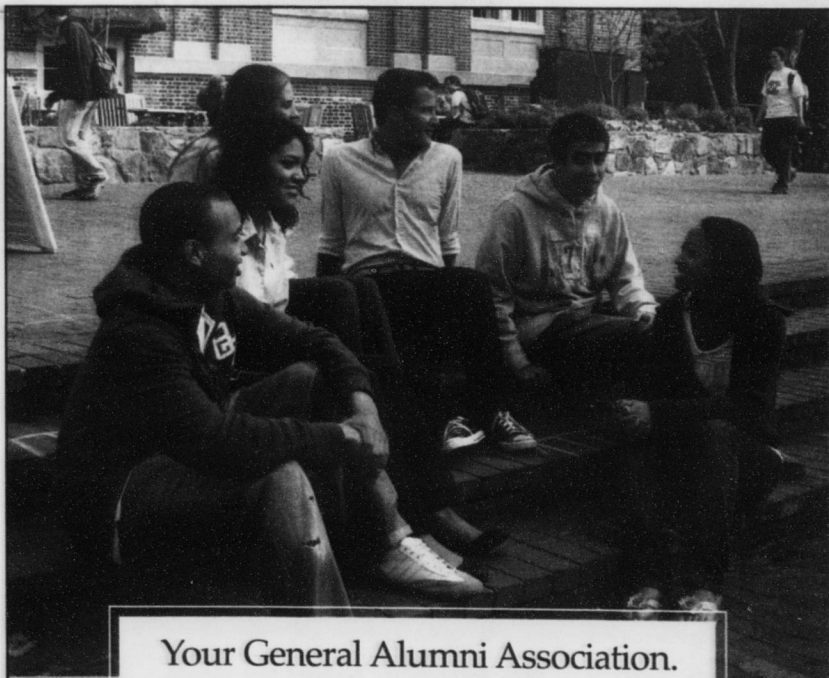
