## Thorp opens term as UNC's 10th chancellor

Was former dean of Arts and Sciences

MAY 8 - Holden Thorp, dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, was elected unanimously by the **UNC-system Board of Governors** 

to serve as UNC's next chancellor. "This is an incredible day," Thorp said. "I'm so grateful to lead the University of North Carolina."

UNC-system President Erskine Bowles enthusiastically supported

the choice and INSIDE said Thorp fit More on the position.
"He's the Thorp's

tomorrow," Bowles said. Thorp's selection marked the end of a 9-month national search pro-

cess that solicited 104 applicants. Bowles cited Thorp's passion and enthusiasm for the job as one

of his biggest strengths. "He has a passion you can feel," Bowles said at the BOG election meeting. "It's absolutely contagious, and I have caught the disease

Thorp, who graduated from UNC in 1986, returned in 1993 as a chemistry professor, doing research

in the electromagnetic properties of DNA and RNA.

Prior to being named dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, Thorp served as chairman of the department of chemistry and director of the Morehead Planetarium and Science Center

Last year, Thorp was selected to replace Provost Bernadette Gray-Little as arts and sciences dean after another national search.

"He's risen so quickly in such a short time," former Chancellor James Moeser said, "and the only way to accurately describe that is to say that he's a supernova."

The search for Moeser's replace-

ment began in October when Moeser announced that he would be stepping down June 30.

UNC Board of Trustees convened a 21-member committee of trustees, alumni, students and staff.

The search committee hired William R. Funk and Associates, a consulting firm, to help solicit applicants, which the committee did dur-ing November and December. The firm was paid about \$100,000.

Chairman Nelson Schwab said the search committee pared down the applicants to six finalists, includ-ing two African-American males and

two white females.

They proposed four names to the BOG on March 26, which approved them the following day.

Thorp said Bowles offered him the position at a gas station in sboro.


"I will never forget the Exxon on Wendover Avenue," Thorp said. "I guess it's a good thing I didn't run in to get Nabs."

The search was conducted almost entirely behind closed doors, with search committee members required to sign confi-

dentiality agreements and meet-ings being held in closed session. But UNC President Emeritus Bill Friday called Thorp an obvious candidate.

"He's the type of talent people look for all over the United States," Friday said.




