UCLA discovers 13-million-digit prime

athematicians at UCLA have bragging rights now that they've discovered a 13-million-digit prime number — the 46th known Mersenne

The formula for the new number is (2P - 1), where P equals 43,112,609, also a prime number.

"We're delighted," said UCLA's Edson Smith, who led the effort. "Now we're looking for the next one, despite the odds."

Thousands globally participate in the Great Internet Mersenne Prime Search, or GIMPS, and the odds that any given number is a Mersenne prime is about one in 150,000. This is the eighth discovered by UCLA.
