## A Copy of a Letter

WRITTEN BY  
OUR SAVIOR, JESUS CHRIST.

Found 18 miles from Inccumium; sixty five years after our blessed Saviour's crucifixion. Transmitted from the holy city, by a converted Jew; faithfully translated from the original copy, now in possession of the Lady Cuba's family at Mesopotamia. You shall diligently and peaceably labor in your respective callings, in which it hath pleased God to call you. You shall love one another with a brotherly love, and cause them that are not baptised to come to Church and receive the sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper, and be made members of the Church; in so doing, I will give you a long life and many blessings; your land shall flourish, and cattle shall abundantly multiply, and I will give you many comforts in the greatest temple-

LENTULUS' EPISTOLE TO THE SENATE OF ROME, CONTAINING A DESCRIPTION OF JESUS CHRIST.
