The Charges and Specifications. CHARGE THE FIRST.

Keep it before the People.

That whilst the steady and certain maintenance of the great Courrowss of 1850, is of vital importance to the Constitutional rights and interests of the Southern States, and to the safety and personnercy of the Union-and the most important object to the whole country to be kept in view in the pending canvass for President and Vice President, the leaders of the Democratic party, whilst professing especial zeal for the manatemmer of these measures have shewn by their actions that for the sake of party advancement they are ready to expose it, especially the Eugitive Slave Law, to the chance of a repeal or such a modification as to render its provisions useless,

Specification isr. That the leaders of the Democratic party, since the passage of the Compromise, in New York, in Ohio, in Connecticut, in New Hampshire, in Massachusetts and in Free Soil abolitionist parties of those States, by which a bargain was entered into by the conshould be composed of an equal number of De to keep a supply for the balance of the season. mocrats and Freesoilers and Abolitisomsts-and that by means of this condition they have been enabled to earry the elections in those States, and to elect many rank Freesoilers and Abolitionists to office.

Specification 20. That the Democratic leadnged by the success of these coalitions in several of the States, laboured to effect and to a great extent did effect, a similar coalition between the Democratic party proper, the Disunionists and Secessionists, and the Freesoilers and Abolitionists throughout the Union for the purpose of carrying the Presidential election-and distributing the offices of Government.

Spacement of the That in consequence of the united opposition to the Compromise, (but for totally different reasons,) of the Freesoilers and Abolitionists, and the Secessionists and Disunionists, the Convention was compelled after discussion, to refuse to pass a national platform of principles, recognizing the binding torce of that Compromise, until after the nomination of a adidate for the Presidency was made,

Specification 2D. That owing to the opposition of the great number in this Democratic Convention to the Compromise measures, the platform of principles put forth by the Conven tion, could not be, and was not adopted by the Convention, but according to high Democratic authority, was smuggled through just at the close of the proceedings, when not more than one third of the members was present-when they were imperfectly heard even by those who were present-and when a considerable portion of those who did hear them voted against them.




