AN IMPORTANT MEETING.

Our Business Men Confer With Mr. Best of the Midland Railroad

There was an important meeting at the Board of Trade Rooms last night. Our business men met President Best of the Midland Railway Company, in accordance with the publications and suggestions made in the Commercial News yesterday.

The following of our commercial men and business firms were present:—

K. R. Jones, W. F. Rountree, Jno. A. Yoemans, Alex. Miller, Geo. B. Guion, Roberts and Brother, Reel Brothers, J. A. Meadow, E. H. Meadows & Co., Jno. U. Smith, E. K. Bryan, Wolfenden and Smallwood, Hackburn Bros., T. A. Green, S. H. Scott, F. Ulrich, C. H. Blank, W. H. Oliver, Jonathan Havens, Dail Bros., J. F. Clark, James Redmond, Geo. Allen and Company, Frank Myer, C. E. Foy and Company, S. H. Gray and T. S. Howard. There were also present Mayor Howard, Dr. Jno. A. Guion, Cashier of the first National Bank; Major John Hughes, A. G. Hubbard, Esq., F. M. Simmons, Esq., and Clement Manly, Esq., of the legal profession, and Mr. James A. Bryan, Chairman of the County Commissioners, and representatives of the press.

After the meeting was called to order the President, C. E. Foy, said:—

Gentlemen:—This meeting was called for the purpose of giving Mr. Best an opportunity of meeting the business men of New Berne. Many of the gentlemen in the room know him, many do not. We will be glad to hear him in regard to his projects, and to make his acquaintance.

To this introduction Mr. Best responded in a very appropriate speech; setting forth his plans and purposes in language and manner to satisfy the assemblage that the Midland lessees of the Atlantic and North Carolina Railroad meant to give the commercial interests of New Berne, the transportation facilities for reaching the interior and communicating with the States of the Great North West, for which the North Carolina system was designed.

The following resolutions were offered and unaniously adopted:—

WHEREAS, We are well assured that the past and present efforts of the Midland North Carolina Railway Company, as lessees of the Atlantic and North Carolina Railroad, have largely contributed to the prosperity of this section of North Carolina, and especially to that part lying immediately along the line of the Atlantic and North Carolina Railroad, and believing that the building of the Midland Railroad and the control of the Western North Carolina Railroad, are absolutely necessary to the complete restoration of this section and the true development of the mineral and agricultural resources of this State, therefore

Resolved, That we thoroughly endorse the movements now on foot to secure the ends above set forth, and feel that the people of the State owe, in this instance, as in all other acts of his life, a debt of gratitude to our late Governor and present Senator, Z. B. Vance, for the noble and patriotic efforts he has made, and is now making in this behalf.

Resolved, That the management of the Atlantic and North Carolina Railroad by Mr. Best and his associates, meets with our entire approval, and we pledge to him and them our full co-operation and support.

The meeting was prolonged and several speeches made, which, stenographically reported specially for the Commercial News, will appear to-morrow.
