A vignette of the late President will appear on the checks for the six per cent. bonds continued at 34 per cent., which are being printed.

Messrs. Longmans will shortly publish a work by the Hon. Captain Bingham on the marriages made or contemplated by the first Napoleon.

After ten years of joint labor on the part of Colonel Yule and Dr. Burnell their "Glossary of Anglo-Indian Words" is nearly ready for the press.

In Paris there are now one hundred and sixty-eight political newspapers. Of these seventy-five daily, with a tidal circulation of little less than two million copies.

The friendship between Thomas Hughes and Arthur Stanley, which began at Rugby, ended only with the latter's death. The November Harper's will contain Hughes' reminiscences of Dean Stanley, illustrated by a full-page portrait.

A New York broker advertises for \$1,000,000 worth of bonds, and expresses a willingness to pay for them at the rate of one-quarter of one per cent. He says he is buying them in accordance with orders from correspondents abroad. Several other New York brokers are buying at the same rate.

The State of Louisiana has offered to the Israelite Immigration Society of New York city 160 acres of land to each and every family the society may locate in a certain part of the State. In response to the offer a committee of ten have been sent to New Orleans to meet the State agent there, and arrange for the transfer thither of a number of families if practicable.

Governor Crittenden, of Missouri, has accepted the appointment of general manager of the Garfield memorial fund. He will at once issue an address calling for contributions. The fund now amounts to \$9,142. Subscriptions to the large Garfield fund closed on Friday, and future donations will be returned to the parties who send them. The total amount subscribed is \$341,313.25. A separate fund of \$18,000 has been raised in Boston.

The Campaign in Virginia.
Hardly at any time within the history of American politics has party spirit run so high as in Virginia during the present campaign. There have not occurred less than a half dozen duels, and we reasonably conclude, from the ferocity of the campaign, the Mahone idea has prevailed to an extent to disturb our brethren across the border.

A late dispatch from Washington contains a letter from Gen. William Mahone as follows:—

"The speech of General Jubal A. Early, in Richmond, October 11,

1881, has been read by me. So far as it refers to myself, the rank of General Early in the Confederate army entitled the speech to that much. It brings me to decide whether I shall demand satisfaction from General Early for what was intended by him as an insult. After years of unprovoked malice and in-direction, he presents the issue squarely and grossly. It admits of no discussion, and would neither be met nor evaded by recrimination. I so accept it. My decision, arrived at advisedly and maturely, is that the rank of General Early, which is his sole claim to recognition, does not outweigh other considerations which forbid such recognition. The public of Virginia need no specifications of facts concerning General Early, on which I rely for their action. I only desire to make it known that I am not ignorant or neglectful of his speech. He could give me no satisfaction, and I can have none even in describing him as he is known to all men. He may, therefore, proceed with his falsehoods and would be insults, assured of impunity as far as I am concerned.

A City of Spies.

These are troublous times in St. Petersburg. A woman was yesterday walking along its streets, carrying a pot of cream. A detective passed, noticed the cream, followed the woman, set his men to watch her while he returned to the station, consulted his photographic gallery of notable nihilists, recognized in the woman a long sought conspirator, and arrested her just as she was taking the train to Moscow. The arrest, which our special cable dispatches report, is significant of the state of the Russian capital. More significant still is the Draconic code issued to landlords and house porters by the Chief of Police. Strict watch is to be kept by the former on the movements of their lodgers. They are to be always on duty. They must never sleep, never go on errands, never enter the house, never allow anybody to stick bills on the walls, throw explosive substances through the windows or do anything that they may set fire to the building. They must know everybody's business who comes in or goes out; they must carry any information they can glean to the police. They are thus made government spies and are already becoming as odious as Fouche's brigade became in France. Lodgers have to fee them or be denounced as suspicious characters. The rule of the Third Section was bad enough, but that of the dvornik is intolerable.

Another Preacher Gone.

It is with unfeigned sorrow that we record the death of Rev. A. A. Boshamer, pastor of Edenton Street Church, Raleigh. After a protracted confinement, by typhoid fever, he passed away on Wednesday morning the 12th inst. No doubt that all was done for him that kindness and skill could do, but he was too frail to withstand the stubborn march of that most stubborn disease, and no skill or kindness could supply the absent strength. From his early youth we have known Bro. Boshamer as one of the gentlest, and at the same time one of the brightest of our promising "boys." His sweet spirit and brilliant intellect won us from the first, as it did all who knew him. We have watched his ascending progress as a preacher with affectionate and unflagging interest, always rejoicing in his success, and sympathizing in his sorrows.

We have seen him disappear as a bright star gone down in undiminished glory, leaving the world darker than it was before, but still to be remembered as a thing of brightness and beauty, never more bright and beautiful than when it hung the last moment just above the horizon.

Farwell, beautiful orb! we must grope awhile without thy light, but

we look with hope for the dawn of the new day, when we shall expect to hail thee as one of the morning stars.

Trade.

The New York Daily Commercial Bulletin illustrates the course of modern trade as follows: As a striking illustration of the present anomalous condition of the export trade, consequent upon unhealthy speculation, a French commercial firm informs us that a correspondent of theirs in Havre is shipping back to them a consignment of flour which had been forwarded from here. The flour will sell at a higher price in this market, even with all the out and back charges added. Comment is unnecessary.

The North Carolina System.

The Clyde syndicate have replied to the letter of the State Commissioners asking them to surrender the Western North Carolina Railroad to Mr. Best and refuse to give up their purchase. They say they intend to hold and operate the road and finish it to both western terminal points. So far from antagonizing Mr. Best's plan of a North Carolina system, they will make connection with his road at Salisbury, giving him imperial access to their road. Besides finishing the road according to the contract, they strongly intimate an intention of extending it direct to Chattanooga, which will make the long wished for through line to the Mississippi Valley.—Alamance Gleaner.
