It states that his speech at the Academy of Music in that city Saturday night was a me'ancholy exhibition of unconscious ignorance of the length or breadth or depth of every topic he laid hold of.

What is believed to be trustworthy information from all the wine producing departments of France, places the product of the present year considerably higher than was the yield of a year ago. Last year 29,667,472 hectolitres were returned, but it is expected that for this year the vintage will reach 32,000,000, and that it may go as high as 36, 000,000.

The Memphis Avalanche and the Cincinnati Commercial have been pronouncing the Eads jetties a failure. A committee appointed by the St. Louis Merchants' Exchange sent out a committee to investigate the facts. The committee report that the channel, as required by law, is two hundred feet in width and twenty six in depth, and will accommodate the largest class of merchant vessel.

President Arthur is reported to have said with regard to the stringency in the money market, in New York, that there was no perceptible stringency in legitimate business transactions of the country; that in the betting transactions on Wall street, where one man wagered his money on the advance and another an the decline of prices, the bet is an even one and the government has no business to interfere either one way or the other.

## Fish Culture.

On the 10th of March last, Mr. Bryant Merritt, one of the substantial and successful farmers of Samson county, received from the Fish Commissioner of the State, Mr. S. G. Worth, nine pairs of German carp. When first received the fish averaged about two and a half inches in length. Mr. Merritt placed them in a small pond near his house, which he had previously prepared for their reception. The pond covers an area of about onefourth of an acre, and in the deepest part is about five feet deep. In this small sheet of water the fish have lived and thrived ever since, having as their companions five of the common perch. As they were placed in the water at a time when River he was very busy with his crop operations for the season, Mr. Merritt paid but little attention to them for some months, but they were regularly fed by members of his family during the time. In the hot months of the summer the carp would come to the surface eagerly whenever they were fed, so that a good opportunity was afforded to witness their rapid growth; but since the nights have Wholesale Liquor Dealers, grown longer and the surface water

has become consequently cooler they prefer the warmer, deeper water, though they will occasionally come to to the surface on bright, sunny days. By invitation of Mr. Merritt, we recently visited his pond, and the day being warm and sunny, had an opportunity of seeing the carp. The older ones were from twelve to fifteen inches in length, while there were myriads of smaller ones, ranging from one to three inches in length. It is reasonable to presume that a relative portion of these "small fry" were young perch; but admitting this, there remains enough of the carp to make in two or three years, a pond full without the perch. Why they are called "German carp" we are at a loss to understand, as they came originally from Persia, in Asia, and from thence were first introduced into England, and, subsequently, throughout the countries of continental Europe.

A mild winter, says the Cincinnati Commercial, is predicted by meteorologists. As the excessive heat of this summer is attributed to the increase of solar radiation, and that increase is due to violent disturbances in the sun's cromosphere, where spots of vast magitude, following a period of quiescence, began to show themselves in May and have continued since, it is argued that the temperature in Arctic latitudes is, and will continue to be, above the average, and that comparatively mild currents of air will be wafted down upon us during
