STEAMER NEUSE.—Captain Roberts received a dispatch from Captain White, Tuesday, stating that the water in the Neuse is now of sufficient depth to allow the Steamer Neuse to resume her trips. Captain Roberts went up to Kinston yesterday for the purpose of bringing her down, and says we may look for her this evening or in the morning.

MEETING OF DIRECTORS ATLANTIC AND NORTH CAROLINA RAILROAD.—At a meeting of the Directors of the A. & N. C. R. R. held in this city on Thursday, the President reported that all outstanding debts made by the late management as well as the present management has been paid; also that the State and county taxes of Carteret county had been paid for this year, and that the tax of Lenoir had been ordered to be paid that day; also the tax of the town of New Bern. The tax of the counties of Jones, Craven and Wayne would be paid on demand, as there is a considerable amount of money in the treasury. This speaks well for State policy management against monopoly management. Thus we see in three months after the lease of the road its bills are settled. It is well known that this management had heretofore promptly paid all demands on the Company, including the interest on its bonded and judgment debt, and we learn from the report of exports that the road was left in a condition to run for five years. This shows there must have been some good management somewhere, and we sincerely trust the future management may be as fortunate as the last. The first installment of \$20,000 on the loan is not due until January 1st.
