Jay Gould and Russell Sage were elected directors of the New York "L" Railroad Company.

The annual report of the Treasurer of the United States shows a large increase in receipts from all sources.

The Tammany braves assembled in the Wigwam and pledged themselves to support the regular Democratic ticket.

The Washington statue to be erected by the merchants of New York was discussed by the Chamber of Commerce.

Southern Republicans are making a concerted effort to have a representative from their section in the Cabinet.

Receiver Frelinghuysen enters upon his duties in the broken bank at Newark. Examiner Shelley's report not yet ready.

The Insurance Commissioner of Delaware has refused to issue a certificate of authority to an alleged grave yard insurance association of Pennsylvania.

Justice Beasley, of the Supreme Court of New Jersey, has dismissed the appeal of convicted directors of the collapsed Mechanics and Laborers' Savings Banks of Jersey City.

Before the Underground Railroad Commissioners Mr. Stephen Towle, Superintendent of City Sewers, testified that the proposed tunnel will not disturb the Broadway Sewer System.

Mr. Perrault, ex-member of the Dominion Parliament, offers to discuss the question of Canadian independence before a public meeting with Sir Francis Hincks and take a popular vote on it.

PASSENGER LIST OF STEAMER NEW BERNE.—The following were the passengers by steamer New Berne outward yesterday.—H. E. Dillon and family of LaGrange; A. T. Uzzle, R. W. Clay, Baltimore.

LARGE ARRIVAL OF FISH FROM MOREHEAD.—Mr. Daniel Bell, of Morehead, arrived in the Sharpie Julia yesterday, with six thousand mullets, two thousand spots, besides six hundred and seventy-five bunches of fish in tubs.

He brought them to this market to dispose of in consequence of the present running of the train, it being Saturday, and no fish traffic up the roads on Sunday, he says.

WORK ON THE MIDLAND EXTENSION.—Of the progress of grading the Midland Road west of Goldsboro, the Messenger says:—

"The work of grading on the Midland North Carolina Road has been accomplished to a point some seven miles from this city and within about two miles of the Johnston county line. We learn that about 400 hands are at work, and Mr. W. G. Brown, who has charge of the construction force, is pushing it with all possible dispatch. The contract for the bridge across Little River has been awarded, and no time is to be lost in its completion. It is to be a temporary structure, to be replaced at a later period by an iron bridge. Yesterday we were shown by Capt. J. W. Andrews, the courteous and gentlemanly engineer and assistant superintendent of the Midland, drawings and specifications of several imposing buildings now in contemplation of being put up by the Midland at or in the vicinity of New Berne. They are intended for extensive machine shops, engine and boiler house, &c. The estimated total cost of these structures is to be about \$30,000.

DOCK IMPROVEMENT.—Mr. J. A. Meadows has the steam dredge deepening the water front at his mill yesterday. These dock improvements were a great necessity to the commercial interests of New Berne and they should be attended to while the dredge is here. Almost every dock in the city wants deepening and this is the opportunity.

WATER ON BEAUFORT BAR.—The Telephone says:—A careful sounding made by some of our pilots, and Capt. Doughty of the schooner K. J. Willard on Tuesday last, developed the fact that we have 26½ feet of water on the bar. This report seems in all respects to be reliable, as the soundings were carefully made. What Southern port can beat it?
