Railroad Matters.

The commissioners of the Cape Fear and Yadkin Valley Railroad will meet in Raleigh on the 19th.

Mr. John W. Garrett was on Wednesday reelected president of the Baltimore and Ohio railroad for the twenty-fourth time.

The purchase of the Chicago & Eastern Illinois Railroad by the Louisville & Nashville combination is regarded as an accepted fact at Chicago.

A motion made before Judge Seymour, at Taylorsville, in the case of McDowell county vs. the Western North Carolina Railroad for the appointment of a receiver, has been refused.

The total value of all railroad property, real and personal, in Virginia, is fixed by the State Auditor, at \$26,940,174, with a net increase of \$351,301, and paying with a tax to the State amounting to \$138,214 a year.

Winston Sentinel says: The last session of the General Assembly granted a charter for the building of a railroad from Fayetteville to Winston, along the line of the old plank road, or near thereto. It is understood that this enterprise, is backed by Northern capitalists. We are informed that books of subscription will be opened in High Point on the 29th of this month. The proposed line takes in the factories on Deep River in Randolph county and penetrates the vast timber forests of central North Carolina, and passes through High Point on its way to Winston. Negotiations are now pending for Southern and Western connections which will open up a vast section of rich country; and it is believed the road will be one of the best paying in the South. Mr. Farnum has charge of the enterprise and work will soon be commenced.

General News.

J. C. Bancroft Davis has been nominated to be Assistant Secretary of State. The debate on the Presidential question was continued in the Senate on Thursday.

Henderson Jones sentenced to be hung January 20th at Augusta, Ga., for murder.

The town of Callwell, Kansas, in the hands of cowboys and the authorities are powerless.

The application of Samuel Clemens (Mark Twain) for a Canadian copyright has been refused.

The Sioux Indians who did not surrender with Sitting Bull have come in. They are very poor.

Goettel, a naturalized American citizen, has subscribed \$62,500 for the relief of the sufferers by the Vienna theatre fire.

Mr. Voorhees, of Indiana, addressed the Senate in opposition to the recommendation of the President's Message regarding silver coinage and silver certificates.

Chief Justice Hunter, of Salt Lake City, has refused to set aside his order, in which he held that the certificate of naturalization held by Delegate Cannon was obtained by fraud.

As a result of the investigation of the charges against members of the Ninth Massachusetts regiment while at Richmond, Va., and Yorktown, twenty of the offenders have been summarily dismissed by order of the Commander-in-Chief.

In Indiana a party of masked men took a young woman from the house of her stepfather and hanged her to a tree until she was almost dead for the purpose of having her reveal certain secrets.

The edition of the Union Ireland which was seized contained a cartoon representing Mr. Forster as about to arrest members of the Ladies' Land League. The Attorney General had declared that the paper was seditious and a direct incitement to murder.

Foreign News.

The Times accuses Prince Bismarck of desiring to advertise himself as patron of the Porte.

A flood on the line of the Oran Railway, Algiers, caused the loss of many lives and several vessels.

In the German Reichstag Herr Windthorst has introduced a motion for partially abrogating the May laws.

Dr. Lamson, who is accused of having poisoned a student at Wimbledon, is now being tried for murder in England.

Germany and England are endeavoring to further an international provision for the protection of sub-marine cables.

The German Reichstag refused to vote a sum for the establishment of a training school for non-commissioned officers in Alsace.

Lord Lyons, the British Ambassador at Paris, has protested against the action of the Tunisian authorities in the Enfida affair.

Official examination into the fire at the Ring Theatre, Vienna, shows the police at fault; the audience died speedily from suffocation.

The acquittal of Rochefort on the charge of libel brought against him by M. Roustan has caused a great sensation in Paris, the result being entirely unexpected.

The Peruvian Minister in Paris announces that he has received a dispatch from Lima confirming a report that Pierola has resigned the Presidency of Peru and embarked for Europe.

The Indian medicine men are here again, and making a perfect nuisance of themselves. They attract crowds of colored people who congregate in the streets and upon the sidewalks, and make passing an impossibility. Where are our policemen?

RETURNED DISABLED.—The schooner Addie Henry, Capt. Dudley, which sailed from this port on the 6th for Philadelphia with lumber and shingles, was towed back yesterday by the revenue steamer Stevens, having been disabled in the late gale. Capt. Dudley states that he was anchored in two fathoms of water, and yet she beat upon the sand with as much violence as if she had been aground.
