LOCAL AFFAIRS.

COMING IN.—Last night at dark four corn schooners were seen coming up the bay.

COLD SNAP.—The weather was cold enough last night to cause some apprehension for the trucking interests.

NEW WAREHOUSE.—The Trent River Transportation Company is building a warehouse at the foot of Craven street.

LARGE GINNING OPERATIONS.—Major Dennison has ginned 1,450 bales of cotton at his mills since the middle of September.

CONDUCTOR INJURED.—Coming down with his train last night, Capt. Hartfield was painfully though not seriously hurt at Falling Creek.

NEW WELL.—Mr. Weathersbee is boring a new well for Dennison's mills, using his new steam apparatus, and making thirty feet per day.

FOREST FIRES.—Fires in the woods were burning and dense smoke rising across the Neuse, and also beyond the Trent, south of James City, yesterday.

INCREASED SALES.—Sales of cotton were larger yesterday than for some days. There is still much of the staple and other produce in the back country.

MOVEMENTS OF RIVER STEAMERS.—The Neuse left for Kinston and White Hall, the Contentnea for Wakeboro, and the Trent for Pollockville, all well laden.

SAILED UNSOLD.—The Schooner Cherubim, Capt. Partridge, sailed for E. City yesterday. Mr. W. S. Chadwick, of Beaufort, offered \$4,500 but the Captain asked \$5,000 for her.

LESSON FROM THE DRAMA.—Young wives, young husbands, stern fathers, indulgent mothers, have all a lesson, a beautiful lesson, to learn in "Hazel Kirke" next Friday evening.

PROCEEDS OF THE FESTIVAL.—We erroneously stated the gross receipts of the festival to be \$500 instead of \$600, and that the proceeds went to repairing the parsonage, whereas they go to the improvement of the church.

ANOTHER BODY RECOVERED.—Capt. Dudley, of the Addie Henry, reports that another body from the wrecked bark Carney the third was recovered on Tuesday by Life Saving Station No. 23, and buried, the rescued carpenter of the Carney making the coffin.

STEAMER NEW BERNE.—The New Berne arrived with fifteen hundred sacks of guano and other large freights for points up Neuse River. She went out with four hundred bales of cotton, besides rice, nava stores, sweet potatoes and new cabbages.

THE MIDLAND DEPOSIT IN THE PACIFIC BANK.—The \$250,000 deposit of the Midland funds in the Pacific National Bank of Boston, is not only safe as to the principal, but Mr. Best, by his successful rescue of that institution from ruin, secures interest on the deposit at three per cent, which is quite an item running back to June last.

The difficulties of the Boston Bank gave Mr. Best his opportunity and we are glad he has so improved it. The presence in our State of a gentleman of such recognized ability and national reputation in finance, is a thing of no little importance to North Carolina interest, and we shall look to him for many valuable services in behalf of our people and in the transactions and developments of the immediate future.

Dr. C. T. Andrews of Bridgewater, Nova Scotia, brother of Superintendent Andrews of the Midland, and almost his "double," arrived by steamer New Berne, and passed up the Midland for Goldsboro.

Messrs Burroughs, of New Jersey. S. H. Child, of New York, S. Appller, Jno. T. Gibbon, H. F. Atwood, L. W. Herring, and J. W. Ramsey, of Baltimore, were among the commercial men at the Gaston House yesterday.

Mr. Jas. E. Bogle, Business Manager of the Hazel Kirke Company, was at the Gaston House yesterday arranging for the bill posting, &c. Mr. Bogle is quite a driving business man, as was Mr. Brown in advance of him, and with such gentlemen as foremen in the arrangement of details, the Company can hardly fail of successful houses on its appearance.

SHIP EXPECTED.—The Norwegian barque, Goldbringer, with a thousand tons of steel rails, out sixty-three days from Newport, Wales, is looked for at Morehead hourly. The name Goldbringer is not inappropriate, as every rail of steel brought here for the Midland represents so much gold added to the wealth of North Carolina.

HOUSE BROKEN INTO.—The house of Sellie Ann Bryan, outside of the city limits, was broken into with an axe, and her daughter Flora, hearing that the door was open, went home and found that the wardrobe and a chest had been rebbed. Going for her mother they proceeded on information to the house of a neighbor where they saw Edith Wood, with one of their dresses on, which she readily surrendered. Arraigned before Justice Brinson, yesterday, Edith was sent to jail in default of bail. She had only been liberated from prison a short time, for stealing.

LIFE SAVING STATIONS.—The House voted for thirty additional Life Saving Stations under suspension of the rules. There will be three new ones on the coast of North Carolina. The following is instructive:—

All district Superintendents are to be disbursing officers and pay masters and have the power and perform the duties of Inspectors of Customs. Their salaries are to be as follows: In Maine and New Hampshire \$1,800; in Massachusetts, \$2,000; in Rhode Island and Long Island, \$2,500; in New Jersey, the same; in the Delaware and Chesapeake Bays, \$2,000; between Chesapeake Bay and Cape Fear River, \$2,000; in Florida, \$1,000; on the Gulf coast, \$1,000; on Lake Ontario and Erie, \$2,500; on Lakes Huron

and Superior, \$2,000; on Lake Michigan, \$2,500; and on the Pacific coast, \$1,800. The pay of the keepers of stations or houses of refuge may be fixed by the Secretary of the Treasury, and shall not exceed \$800.

THE ADDIE HENRY.—The Addie Henry, Capt. Dudley, arrived from Baltimore yesterday, fourteen days out, during eight days of which he was detained at Hatteras. He passed the Swash, Benjamin T. Bugg, a large three masted Schooner, with guano consigned to the Midland, aground since Tuesday, and another vessel, for New-Berne, name unknown. He also reported that the three masted schooner, W. H. Tatum, which left for Bay River some three weeks since to load with lumber passed out at Hatteras Inlet as he came in.

NORTH CAROLINA.

North Carolina stands third in the list of copper producing States.

The collapse of the Mahone is the caption of one of the Messenger editorials.

The cotton production in North Carolina has more than doubled during the last ten years.

The Pittsboro Argus says it is computed that the available water power of Chatham is greater than that of the entire State of Connecticut.

The Argus says Chatham has an elevation of 60 feet and that the line of mean annual temperature of 60 which is one of the choicest of all climates, passes, across this county.

The associated railways have asked of Goldsboro the privilege of erecting a suitable building across the tracks of the several roads, for ticket offices, bagging rooms, sitting rooms, and eating house; the structure to be a highly ornamental two story building.

GENERAL NEWS.

A warehouse and 4,000 bales of cotton burned at New York, Tuesday night, loss about \$80,000.

The sloop Dauntless ashore on Fox Shoals, off the Virginia coast; two men were washed off and lost.

The Blackfeet Indians are committing depredations in Northwest territory; killing traders and driving off cattle.

One man killed and another dangerously injured at Lancaster, Pa., while firing a salute in honor of the Democratic victory in that city.

Manchester (Eng.) cotton masters, in view of declining prices and increasing stocks, urge the adoption of short time in the manufacturing department.

The captain's wife and two children and two seamen of a wrecked barque were picked up off the coast of California; they were famishing and about to resort to cannibalism.

Consul General Wolf and the Americans at Cairo gave a grand banquet in honor of Washington's birthday to the Egyptian Minister. Araby Bey pronounced a eulogium on Washington.

Ex-Confederate soldiers, resident in Cincinnati presented a memorial tablet to the widow of the late President Garfield; C. A. Whittier, formerly of Gen. Morgan's staff, made the presentation speech.

Advices from Chicago report a general storm throughout the West, with sleet and high winds; wires are down and railroads badly washed the disastrous effects of the flood seem to be increasing along the Ohio and Mississippi rivers.

FOREIGN NEWS.

English cotton masters desire to reduce production to keep up prices.

Americans in Berlin celebrated Washington's Birthday by a banquet. Wreckage continues to wash ashore on the Irish coast from the City of London.

The disabled steamer Sardinian, from Portland, via Halifax, has arrived in the Mersey.

The Sandown Grand Prize was won by the Duke of Hamilton's five-old bay oak Scott Guard.

Count Schouvaloff, head of the Appanage Department of the Russian imperial household, is dead.

Castelar fears a Slav invasion of Europe, and calls for an alliance of all the Latin races with Germany.

A Portuguese Deputy proposes the close alliance of Spain and Portugal and a reduction of their respective armies.

Mr. Michael Davitt was elected member of Parliament for Meath to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. A. M. Sullivan.

Mr. Bradlaugh again attempted to take his seat in the House of Commons, but was expelled from the House on motion of Sir Stafford Northcote.

The great trial of twenty-one leading nihilists, indicted for various conspiracies against the Russian government, has been begun in St. Petersburg.

A formidable revolt against Egypt has been begun in the Soudan, the Sheikh Mohammed Ahmed defeating the Egyptian troops and killing the Governor of Fashola.

The German Legation.

The Times' despatch from Berlin says:—Great surprise is expressed here at the non-appointment of a successor to Mr. White as American Minister. It is thought that Prince Bismarck will retaliate by postponing indefinitely the appointment of a successor to Herr von Schloizer.

Cotton.

One of the largest meetings of cotton master- ever held took place in Manchester, England. The chairman dwelt on the serious position of the trade caused by the declining prices and increasing stocks. A resolution was unanimously passed that it is necessary to adopt short time in the manufacturing department, and circulars have been sent to all the masters of North and Northeast Lancashire asking whether they are willing to reduce production to the extent of two weeks work during March.

The Americans resident in Berlin in a banquet in honor of Washington's birthday. The staff of the legation were present, and flags were displayed on the residences of Americans. There were one hundred and fifty persons present at the banquet, including Professor Gaest, Herr Bansen and other.

General Skobelev's speeches are said to have been prompted by a desire for notoriety. Small importance is attached to the incident by Germany and Austria.

The Herzegovinians after forty days siege have captured an Austrian fortress; the garrison escaped with loss; the whole population of the upper Drina have joined the insurgents.

Storms accompanied by rain and snow prevailed throughout almost the entire country and in Canada. Telegraph wires were blown down, railway bridges washed away and other serious damage was caused.

A fire at Liberty, Va., destroyed a block of buildings; loss about \$3,000; partially insured.
