LATEST NEWS BY MAIL.

LETTER OF VICE PRESIDENT BRECKINRIDGE.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Oct. 22.—Vice President Breckinridge says in a letter to the Central Committee that he cannot endorse the course of Judge Douglas in the late session of Congress upon the Kansas question; but that question being partially settled, and Douglas being the leader of the Democratic party in Illinois in the present fight against Black Republicanism, he sympathizes with him and desires his success. He trusts that the Democracy of Illinois, which has never given a sectional vote, will not now be found lagging in her duty to the constitution and Union. The report that Mr. Breckinridge desires to address the people of Illinois, is incorrect.

LATER FROM UTAH.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 22.—Salt Lake advices to the 20th September have been received. A good feeling prevailed between the Mormons and Gentiles. The former spoke quite favorably of the Government. Gen. Johnson's command of some 8,000 men were in the grand encampment for the winter. The mail party encountered snow storms on the way, and it was feared that some of the trains would be overtaken in the mountains.

EXECUTION OF MRS. TWIGGS.

DANVILLE, Pa., Oct. 22.—Mr. Twiggs was executed today for the murder of her husband and Mrs. Clark. She protested her innocence on the scaffold, and her readiness to die, only regretting to leave behind her two orphan children.

CHARTER OF A STEAMER—REPRIEVE OF BARRETT.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—The Navy Department today chartered the side wheel steamer Metacomb, of New Orleans, belonging to Wm. C. Templeton, for the Paraguay expedition. Barrett's execution has been postponed two weeks by the President.

BRECKINRIDGE FOR DOUGLAS.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 22.—The Democratic Central Committee received this morning a letter from Vice President Breckinridge, favoring the election of Douglas to the Senate. It will be published in the State Register to-morrow.

THE CANVASS IN ILLINOIS.

BLOOMINGTON, Ill., Oct. 22.—Dr. Long, the administration candidate for congress in the third district, has withdrawn, and advises his friends to support the regular nominees, including the Representatives, who will vote for Douglas.

THE KANSAS GOLD MINES.

LEAVENWORTH, Oct. 21.—Miners from the South Platte mines bring authentic reports of the existence of gold all along the river.

FURTHER BY THE EUROPA.

ENGLAND. The Limerick Chronicle says that on the assembling of Parliament the government will recommend giving to Galway a grant of £50,000 as the first instalment for the construction of a breakwater, should the commissioners' report be favorable. The commissioners had arrived to commence investigations. This is intended to accommodate the line of steamships to New York.

FRANCE. Accounts of a great commercial catastrophe at Lille had been received at Paris. A magistrate at Lille had granted a warrant for the arrest of the principal of a house there, an eminent physician.

SPAIN. The prelate who is placed at the head of the French mission in China, is to be raised to the rank of Cardinal.

THE INDEPENDENT, of Turin, has declared the visit of Prince Napoleon to Warsaw an event of great political importance, being, as it thinks, the prelude of an alliance between France, Russia and Piedmont, hostile to Austria.

THE GAZETTE publishes a royal ordinance authorizing the government to receive tenders for a line of packets to run between the Peninsula and the Antilles, the tenders to be adjudicated on the 3d of February next.

A semi-official journal says the government is about to have built four large and eight small steamers, and thirty-two screw gun-boats, for the suppression of piracy in the Philippine Islands.

PRUSSIA. A decree has been issued by the King of Prussia appointing the Prince of Prussia Regent. The Prince is to carry on the government until the restoration of the King's health upon his own responsibility.

AUSTRIA. Baron Ward, originally a Yorkshire groom, and subsequently Prime Minister of Parma, had died at Vienna.

TURKEY. The reduction of the Austrian army had commenced. Four sections of the superior command of the army had been dissolved.

SARAJEVO. The Montenegrins had hoisted their flag in Sarajevo, a territory on the coast of the Adriatic.

TREMBLENDOUS PILES OF GOLD.—The bullion in the Bank of France now stands at about \$120,000,000—a far higher sum than was ever before held by that establishment, and more than \$3,000,000,000 in excess of the largest total ever collected in the Bank of England. At the commencement of the present year the Bank of France had less than \$50,000,000, and the influx in nine months has therefore been \$70,000,000. At the Bank of England the total at the beginning of the year was \$53,500,000, and it is now more than \$111,000,000. The highest sum it ever possessed was \$111,000,000, in July, 1852.
