TENNESSEE ANNUAL CONFERENCE.—Of this body, now in session at McMinnville, the New Era of the 21st, says: "A large number of ministers are in attendance to the M. E. Conference for this State, which convened in the Court House on yesterday morning."

TEN BROECK WINNING.—On the day previous to the English Cascar race there was to have been a match for \$2,500, with \$1,000 forfeit, between Mr. Ten Broeck's Priores and Sir J. Hawley's Headman, which won the great Derby race last year. Sir J. Hawley did not bring forward his horse, and Mr. Ten Broeck pocketed the \$1,000 without any trouble.

A DUEL WITHOUT SECONDS.—The St. Martinsville (La.) Courier of the 2d inst., says: Yesterday morning, in consequence of a difficulty between Mr. Gabriel—and Mr. Francois Bourgette, of our village, these two persons went, without seconds, but with guns well-loaded with buckshot, to the prairie behind St. Martinsville. There they fired at each other. Mr. Gabriel was untouched, but Mr. Bourgette received a shot in the head. The wound is a fatal one.

WHAT IT IS TO "RUN FOR CONGRESS."—Gen. Jas. Ashley, Congressman elect from the Fifth Ohio District, made a speech at Toledo a few nights ago, in which he said: "I have labored as I never labored before in my life—although I am known as a worker. Entering the contest in a District comprising ten counties, the largest in the State—and with a majority of three hundred against us, I have successfully concluded a canvass which I believe unequalled in point of labor in this or any other State, making, as I have inside of sixty working days, ninety-nine speeches, averaging in length two and a half hours each, and traveling in baggage, on horse back, and on foot, over fourteen hundred miles, to say nothing of trips by railroad."

STEALING A COFFIN.—Two men have been arrested in Wolverhampton, England, for stealing a coffin. The coffin was of copper, and worth \$300. The thieves took out the body, and left it in the tomb, and sold the coffin for old copper.

A TWENTY YEARS TRIAL.—In Henry County, Ga., last week a jury found Francis J. Gobia guilty for whipping a negro to death in 1844. He escaped justice by flying from the State at the time of the occurrence, and since the commission of the deed has married and raised a family.

THE ATLANTIC TELEGRAPH.—The Atlantic Telegraph seems now to be generally given up on both sides of the water. "Down among the dead men" in the bottom of the sea, it is as dumb as the skeletons that lie around it, with not as much prospect of resurrection. Very few tears, except those of stockholders, are shed over it, and on this side the water we shall be well content to wait for another enterprise, in which this country will not be imbecile enough to manufacture a lightning conductor which will enable Great Britain, whenever it suits her purposes to hurl her thunder bolts into the very centre of our citadel.

IMPORTANT TO THE LADIES.—It is beginning to be, says the N. Y. Day Book, quite the rage among the young ladies to cut the hair off at the sides and wear it in a profusion of short frizzled curls, which is supposed to give the wearer a coquettish appearance. It is true that the girls look well this way—just as they do every other way—but did they know that the fashion they have adopted was introduced here by a certain class of females, and is now the distinguishing feature of the "Lorette" in Paris, they might be inclined to hide themselves at home until their tresses were grown again. What do you suppose French and German gentlemen fresh from the old country think when they meet you on Broadway?

TROUBLE BETWEEN FRANCE AND BRAZIL.—A Paris letter in the Nord states that a trifling disturbance has arisen between France and Brazil. A merchant having died at Pernambuco, leaving children under age, the French Consul put seals on his premises, the local authorities maintained that he had no right to do so, as by Brazilian law, the children being born in Brazil were Brazilians, and subject to the law of the country. On appeal to the justice of the peace, he decided that the local authorities were in the right, and the seals were removed. In consequence the French Minister struck his flag, in order to await the instructions of his Government.

SERVANTS AND HELPS.—One of those "English muffs, ye kno," came over into "the States" the other day, from Canada. He took lodgings at an inn, in a bordering village which shall be nameless. He had dinner; and among those who sat at the table with him, was the waiting maid, whom he designated as "servant"; but he received an indignant correction from the landlord: "We call our servants, Sir, Helps. They air not oppressed; they air not Russian serfs." "All right," said the "bloody Britisher," "I shall remember." And he did; for in the morning he awoke the whole house, by calling out, at the top of his voice, which was like the tearing of a strong rag: "Help! help!—water! water!" In an instant every person equal to the task rushed into his room with a pail of water. "I am much obliged to you, I am sure," he said; "but I don't want so much water, ye kno—I only want enough to shave with!" "Shave with?" said the landlord: "what did you mean by calling 'Help! water?' we thought the house was a fire." "You told me to call the servants 'Help,' and I did: 'did you think I would cry water when I meant fire!'" The explanation, it should seem, was satisfactory.

A MAN AND WOMAN BURNED TO DEATH.—A fire occurred in the fifth-story tenement-house 184 Sixth street, New York, on Thursday night. Six families occupied the premises and as the rooms were soon filled with dense smoke, a man named Michael Hertel, and his daughter Catharine, a young woman twenty years old, were suffocated and burned to death. The cellar was used as a stable, and twelve horses were suffocated. Noticing the announcement of the marriage of a Mr. Wallach to a Mrs. Mary Day, the Louisville Journal says that this looks like a union of Wallachian and Moldavian Principalities.

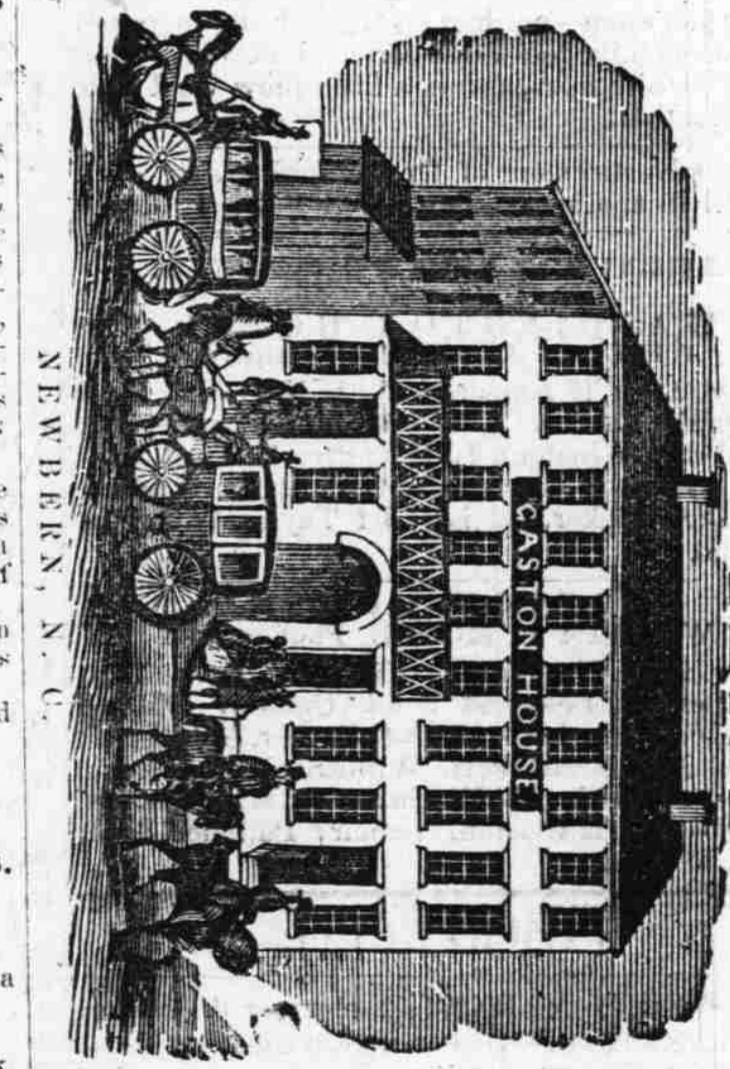
