ATTEMPT TO RESCUE.—On Monday night last, says the Leisure, Hour of last week, an abortive attempt was made to liberate from our Jail, Obadiah Christmas, who is to be tried next week at Person County Superior Court, for the murder of a slave.

SUICIDE IN COURT.—A suit which had been in progress for some time at Columbus, (Ga.) and in which Wm. Mewherter, an old and well known citizen of the county, was defendant, terminated by the jury rendering a verdict that the defendant—who had been an agent for Shrewsbury & Price, millers—had in hand unaccounted for over \$10,000.

NEW YORK FOR SALE.—Amongst the singular events of the day, is the advertisement of the sheriff of New York, occupying three columns and a half in which he offers to sell the greater part of the real property of the city to the highest bidder, as (says the Post) the Pratorian legions sold the Roman empire.

SENTENCE OF A POISONER.—Chamiski, who fatally poisoned four persons, in Barbour county, Georgia, was last week sentenced to imprisonment for life. The alleged poisoning occurred in Pike, in September, 1857, and resulted in the death of four persons, Mr. Thomas Frizzell, an old gentleman of about 80, his grand daughter, Miss Betsey Jane Frizzell, a young lady of about 15 or 16 and the wife and child of Mr. Dubose, the overseer.

REWARD OFFERED.—A reward is offered for the discovery of Mr. James B. Billings, who is missing from his residence in New York. Mr. Billings was formerly clerk at the Irving House, and when the Girard Hotel, in Philadelphia, was built, was employed in the same capacity there, but finally became a proprietor. He made a handsome fortune, and retired some two years since. He has been suffering with softening of the brain brought on by over exertion in his business. The malady had increased lately.

SPAIN.—Spain is in a fair way of having her hands full. She is preparing an expedition against the Moorish pirates of the Rif—a formidable expedition, consisting, it is said, of 10,000 men; and another against Mexico, which will be a very expensive affair. Of the latter, the ships for the transport of troops, have already sailed except one, which is detained at Cadiz by stress of weather. How far the Spanish treasury can stand such drains as these remains to be seen.

JEWELS OF THE PRIZE RING.—Morriss's sparkling exhibition and grand complimentary benefit came off in New York on Friday evening, in Hoyn's theatre, Bowery. Two thousand five hundred tickets were taken at the doors. 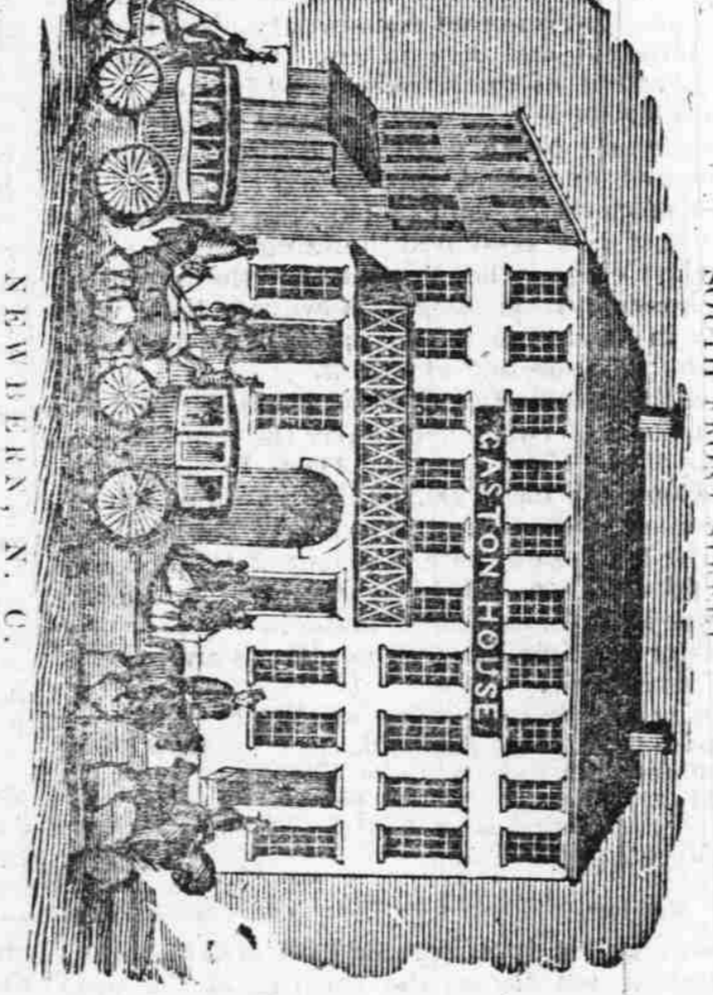
