THE NEW TELEGRAPH LINE.—The new telegraph line between this city and Goldsboro', says the Raleigh Register of Friday, which has been in course of erection for some weeks past, has just been completed and opened to the use of the public.

MURDERED.—Peter Shultz of Winston, N. C., says the Greensboro' Times of last week, was brought before his Hon. Jno. M. Dick, of this place, on Monday last, on a writ of habeas corpus, for the murder of Costin Holder.

DIVIDEND.—The Bank of the State of North Carolina has declared a dividend of five per cent. from the earnings of the Bank for the last six months.

SENATOR DOUGLAS EN ROUTE.—Senator Douglas stopped at St. Louis, on his way down the Mississippi to New Orleans, and made a speech, from which the following is an extract:

OUR FATHERS.—"Our fathers," said Mr. Douglas, "made both free and slave States, and designed that they should remain so, if the people should so choose. Let any State attend to its own affairs, and it will be prosperous and happy. If you, here in Missouri, will take care of your own negroes, and mind your own business, you will be at peace with the whole world. You have a right to have slavery if you wish it, or not to have it, just as you please. In Illinois, the people tried it for twelve years, when it was a Territory, and they became satisfied that they could make more money without it, and so they decided not to have it longer. In Missouri the people could do as they pleased. Their duty was pointed out to them by the Constitution. If the doctrine of State Rights is carried out, and we take the Constitution for our guide, there is no reason why each State cannot be friendly with the others. There was no reason, he thought, why we could not all be friends together, and labor for the promotion of our country's good."

WANT'S TO FIGHT TOM HYER.—A daring Buckeye has addressed to the fighting world, through the columns of The Noble County Democrat, a card stating that he accepts the challenge of Mr. Thomas Hyer to fight for \$10,000. The editor of The Democrat thus speaks of Mr. Deck: "Mr. Deck is an American by birth, and one among the most respectable citizens of our community; and although we know him to be a man of great physical force, possessed of unusual amount of daring and energy, yet we little thought that he, of all men else upon the continent, would propose to meet the acknowledged 'bull dog' of America in a single combat. He has many friends who will back him, who claim that, in point of science, he is not inferior to Hyer, and is able to compete with any man in the States in muscular power. His height is rising six feet—straight as an arrow—and weighs, when stripped, 260 pounds. He is said to have been in the ring but once, and then proved successful. 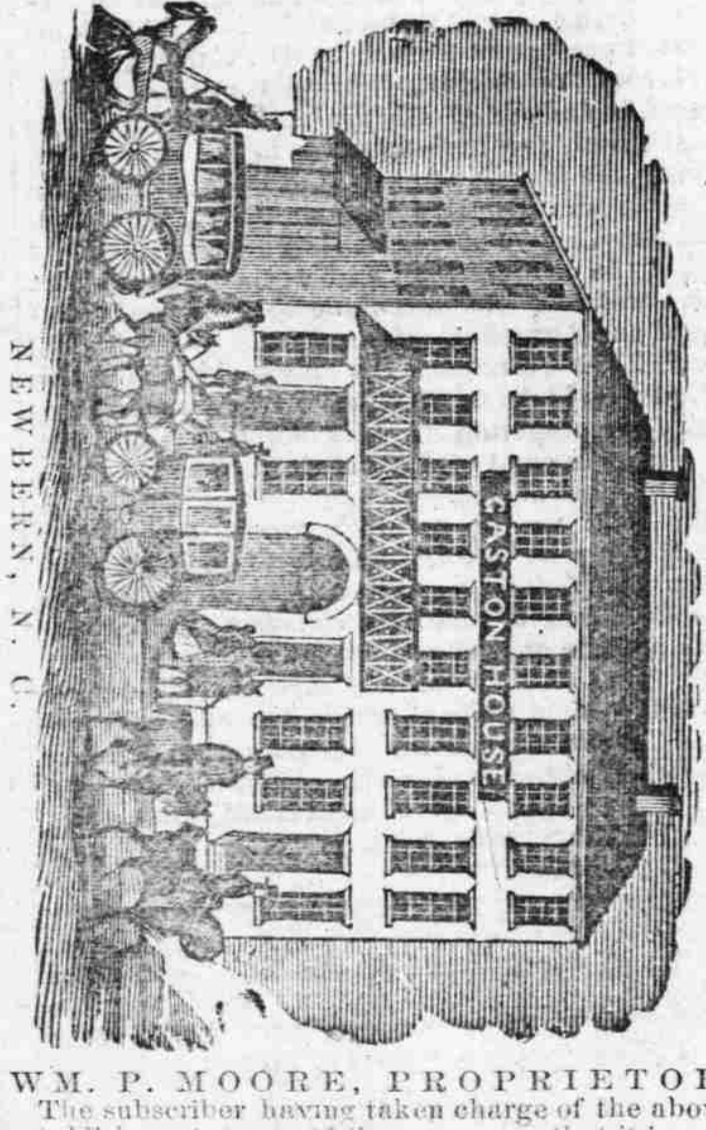
