"Yes, well, them that don't go into startin' newspapers and mangin' opera houses for a livin' generally contrive to pick up a precarious and onartin' livin' as schoolmasters."

"Class dismissed, half holiday."

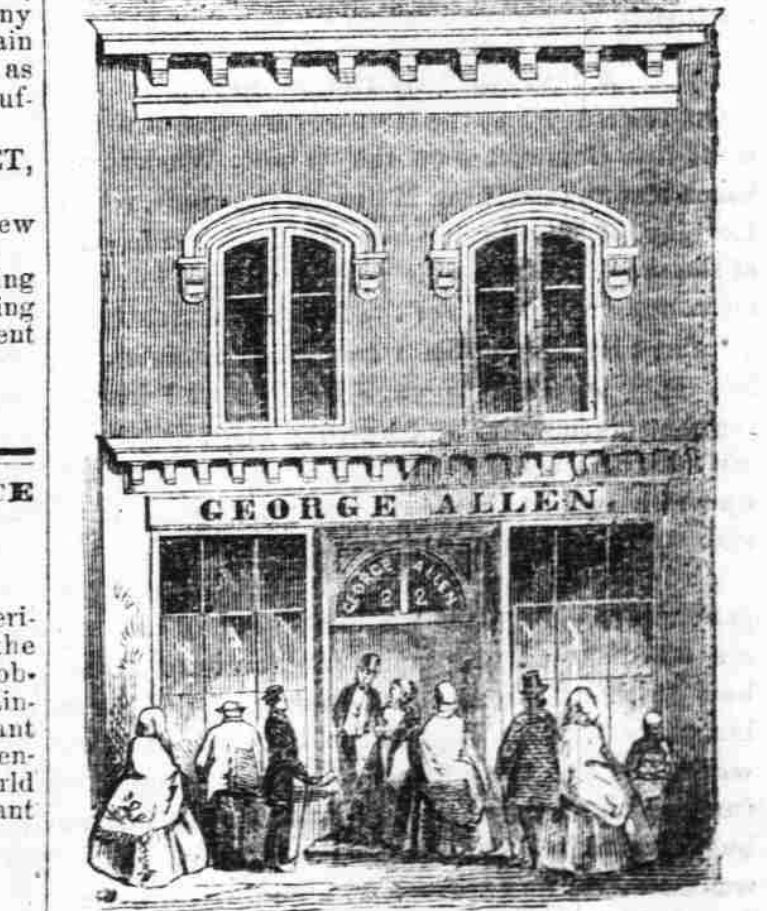
