The Chilian and Spanish authorities are convinced that Spain purposes to renew the war upon them on the return of the auspicious season. They are still engaged upon defensive works. The Chilian Government, however, does not appear to give the satisfaction to the people which Prado's management has afforded the Chilians. A private letter from Valparaiso, dated the 18th of September, and published in the New Bedford Me cary says:

The Government is making a great district. The spanish-Chi.lan war.

The Government is making a great display of preparation for the reception of the Spaniards, fortifying the city with such despatch that there is a prospect of the completion of their plans in something like six years. A number of guns have also been cast which would be ready for mounting if the greater part had not been burst in their trial. A fine 300 pound rifle was also successfully smuggled from the United States, but unfortunately it was lost overboard while taking it from the ship which brought it out, and it cannot be recovered. The Peruvians on the contrary have managed well and are in a good state of defence. He is now about to abdicate, and the regular election of President will take place, and without doubt he will be elected to the position. He seems to be the most liberal and persevering man that has even been at the head of these mongrel Governments, and will on loobtedly place Peru at the head of the South American Republics.

Important Letter s'rom General Sheridan, NO VIOLATION OF OUR NEUTRALITY LAWS WILL BE

NEW OGLEANS, October 26 .- The following important letter appears this evening : HEADQUARTERS DEPART'T OF THE GULF.

NEW ORLEANS, LOUISIANA, October 23, 66

General-I am satisfied that there is only one way in which the state of affairs on the Rio Grand can be bettered, and that is by giving the heartiest support to the only government in Mexico recognized by our own: the only one which is really favorable to us. You will, therefore, warn adherents of any party or pretended gov-ernment in Mexico, or in the State of Tamaulippas, that they will not be permitted to violate the neutrality laws between the Liberal Govern-ment of Mexico and the United States, and also that they will not be permitted to remain in our territory and receive the protection of our flag in order to complete their machinations for the violation of our neutrality laws. These instructions will be enforced against adherents of the Imperial buccauser representing the so-called Imperial Government of Mexico, and also against the Ortega, Santa Anna, and other factions.-President Jamez is the acknowledged head of the Laberal Government in Mexico.

A NEW WATER PURIFIER.—The Scotsman says that a gentleman residing m the neighborhood of the river Esk has, after repeated observation and experiment, discovered that the solid refuse of shale used in the manufacture of paraffine oil is a most perfect purifier of the filthiest water,— Two bottles, one of them filled with the sewage and the other with Crawley water, as submitted being requested to select the one preferable for drinking purposes, unhesitatingly chose that which had been purified by the shale refuse.—
This substance is at present thrown aside by the manufacturers of paraffine oil as valueless,
