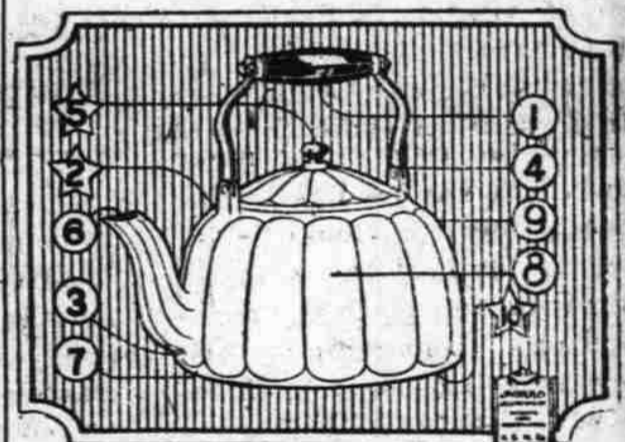
WILKESBORO METHODISTS CLOSE SUCCESSFUL REVIVAL
