A GENERAL IDEA IN TIME.

A few days ago we published a double column of interesting comments upon the Wilkes county fair from various persons throughout the county. These comments were interesting and most valuable coming from those who have the welfare of their people at heart and who themselves stand for advancement and incidentally for things higher and better. The names alone of those to the short cards were, within themselves, suggestive of such, and we could not help noting this fact. The officials of the fair association consider the suggestions of the utmost value in their effort to reach and interest. The general tone of those comments are so peculiarly interesting that it is of value to read a glancing synopsis from them. Such as, "the moral and religious features should not only be upheld but promoted," "emphasize educational day and bring in that important organization the Boys' Corn Club," "good premiums to induce young stock to be bought," emphasize the average farm—"I am not a crank but I want to see a progressive, clean, sober, honest citizenship," "promote community and home," one of the members of last year urges that the chief marshal have rules and regulations observed by the marshals, which was spoken of last year, and that all gamblers rubbing people of hard earned money be kept out. Emphasize poultry department and let the people "prepare in time and don't wait," it means something for a person to show that he or she has produced the best article in his line whatever it be; the same person about May 1st had 225 spring chicks. "flowers and fancy cooking" was also emphasized, and another most interesting was to have a contest for boys or girls, under a certain age, to compete for prize in writing an article on agriculture or agricultural machinery.

This means that the article or essay shall apply to Wilkes county. The contest shall be limited to those boys and girls who attended any of the public schools of the county during the past year season, or those who by age did or could have. The essays will be printed in the Hustler, when all have been handed in before the time of the Wilkes county fair. Judges will be appointed by the fair association to decide upon the best writing, written. A date will be announced after which time all of the essays shall be expected to be sent in to us. This is in order that each shall be published and for the reason that all cannot be published in the same issue of the paper. It may be decided by next week as more conducive to have the amount divided so that there shall be a first and second prize. Let some one bright boy or girl from every school in the county send in their best. In fixing the prize it has been the object to make it well worth the effort of the boy or girl, and at the same time as effective and most interesting interest.

The Lord Remoed Jackson That the Confederacy Might Fall.

Richmond News-Leader, 1865.

"Having decreed in Thy wisdom that the South should not attain its independence by arms Thou didst take to Thyself Thy servant, Thomas J. Jackson."

Such was the quaint prayer of a devout Presbyterian divine intensely loyal to the South, in which he struggled to bow meekly to the will of Providence when General Lee's great lieutenant fell 47 years ago today. Jackson was great enough fully to appreciate the splendor of Lee's transcendent military genius, and the one man in the South who could grasp the full spirit and carry into execution the plans of his chief.

It is idle to speculate upon what might have been, but there are those who very firmly believe that had Jackson lived there would have been no Gettysburg, no Wilderness, no Appomattox, because there would have been no army of the Potomac to fight them. It would have been destroyed at Chancellorsville, and, as a

result, the South would have dictated peace in Washington.

After all, the place divine may have been right. Appomattox may not have been because of Gettysburg, or because of Grant, but because of God.
