In this issue of the Hustler is printed an itemized statement of the finances of the town of North Wilkesboro. Look over it.

Henry Varner's newspaper has moved into a house of its own after getting over eighteen years old and heralds itself with a big electric sign at night.

The Asheville Citizen says that lawyers say the court docket there is in better shape now than it has been twenty-six years. Good for the new system we hope. Lawyers can be overburdened as well as other folks.

The State Farmers Union meets in Greenville this week and Mr. A. A. Hendon and others will attend from this county. The Progressive Farmer says the Union has done a big work this year and is stronger in North Carolina than anywhere else in America.

Charles D. Hilles, chairman of the national Republican committee, announces that the call for their national convention in 1916 will be on the new basis which reduces their representation in the convention eighty nine votes. Most of this loss falls upon the Southern Republicans of which North Carolina Republicans is to lose three.

The Charlotte Observer carries the picture of the United States foreign minister to Belgium who warns this country to double its cadets at West Point and not be caught like Belgium by Germany. He advises a large army and navy and says the "only road to peace" is overthrowing German militarism. Germany's got armies and navies but she's got no peace. So why? Why follow Germany's steps?

The Wadesboro Ansonian says that at the graded school there last week one of the instructors, Miss Frazier, (whose name is to be honored) with only a day's notice collected seventy-two contributions for the Christmas ship to go to the warring nations of Europe by a ship from New York. Each donor's name went with the gift; which altogether amounted to four dollars eighty cents in cash besides dolls, toys, clothing, shoes, stockings and many other things both new and second hand in good condition.

It's hard to get any vote from our congressional district to show what Congressman Page's majority is. From county exchanges down in the district it must be about as follows in some of the counties: Davidson 105 majority for his opponent; the State Democratic ticket in Montgomery county got about 124 majority; the county Democratic ticket in Anson got a majority of 817; in Richmond Page won by 1124; in Yadkin he lost according to the Pilot by about 575; in Union the Democratic majority for State senator was about five or 700; Randolph about 344 majority for Page; Wilkes 1125 majority for McRary. The other counties are Davie Moore, Lee, Scotland and Hoke.

Dougherty Resigns as Supt.; Not Accepted. Wadesboro Democrat.

County superintendent Prof. B. B. Dougherty, tendered his resignation to the board of education which was in call session Monday. It was not acted upon, and the matter was laid over until the next regular meeting of the board, when it will be taken up and disposed of.

It is generally conceded that the reason they lost here (and this condition seems to have been general throughout the State) was that their true meanings and purposes were not thoroughly understood by the great masses of the people.

So his campaign was necessarily largely confined to the newspapers which he says did magnificent work, but that 30 days was all too short within which
