SCHOOL MATTERS.

Before the Commissioners—What They Did.

J. H. Pennell was attached to district No. 72.

J. W. Walker and W. B. Ferguson were appointed school committeemen in district No. 55.

The petition of A. L. Hendrix, et al, asking for a new school district was filed, and the committeemen in districts No. 14 and 22 were notified to appear at November meeting and show cause, if any, why said petition shall not be granted.

J. E. Nichols was appointed school committeeman instead of Anderson Eller, who failed to qualify, according to law, in district No. 54.

The committee in school district No. 92 were instructed and required to have the school of said district taught in the Wilson Bumgarner house on the lands of T. J. Deal, and all those who are inconvenienced thereby have the privilege of attaching themselves to such districts as may suit them.

At The Churches.

The series of meetings which have been in progress at the Presbyterian church, Wilkesboro, were closed Sunday night. As a result, a large number of professions were brought about, and the church was greatly revived.

Mr. Miller, who assisted Mr. Robinson, is a plain, forcible reasoner, and his able sermons were complimented on all sides.

The meeting at Moravian Falls which was on several days also closed Sunday. About twelve persons were converted—11 joined the church and 9 were baptized Sunday afternoon by Rev. R. W. Bradshaw. Rev. Mr. Stringfield, who conducted the services, preached at this place Sunday morning and delivered a most highly interesting lecture Sunday night.

The Primitive Baptist Association convened at Fairplains Friday and closed Sunday. Some able sermons were preached, which were listened to by large congregations. The crowd was estimated at about one thousand Sunday, while the order of those who attended was pronounced as being the best ever seen at that place.

Stock Law Election.

The Board heard the petition of G. A. Crysel, and others, asking for a stock law election to be held in the following boundary: beginning at the junction of the Yadkin and Reddick river, running up Reddick river to A. A. Whittington's mill, then to the top of Deep Ford hill at Jess Nichols' place, thence with road from said Nichols' place to the Bumgarner land, then with said land to Mrs. John Center, then a direct line from there to the ford at Parlier's creek at Mrs. Rebecca McNeil's down to Lewis Fork creek, then down to the Yadkin river, then to the beginning, and it was granted. The election was ordered to be held at Millers Creek on the 21st of November, and Z. V. Nichols was appointed registrar and W. T. Minton and J. M. Gaither judges.
