COL. T. L. HARGROVE.  
This gentleman has been for nearly  
four years Attorney General of  
North Carolina, and during that  
time has discharged the duties of

mains to their last resting place.

"Ladies Court," Harbinger of Jeri-  
sh, made its appearance in full regalia.

SETTLE AND VANCE IN THE  
WEST.  
We have just had an interview  
with a gentleman from the West  
who has heard Settle and Vance at  
several places during the past two  
weeks, the last time at Bakersville,  
Mitchell county. He corroborates  
the statements of our correspond-  
ents in that Settle towers like an  
eagle over Vance, and completely  
demolishes him at every speaking  
place. He says that Vance has in  
a great measure lost his voice, and  
with it the fire and magnetism  
which characterized him of old;  
that he speaks with evident labor  
and dragging effort. His friends  
go away chagrined and disappoint-  
ed, and universally admit that Set-  
tle is the ablest orator and has the  
best of the argument. Gov. Settle  
improves as the campaign ad-  
vances; his voice is unimpeded and  
rings like a bell; he speaks with  
the terrible earnestness of sincerity;  
keeps his antagonist constantly on  
the defensive, and is daily winning  
friends and votes.

VIRTUOUS JIMMY LEACH.  
Judging from the manner in which  
"foul-mouthed Jimmy Leach" is  
crying out against Union men and  
trying to bolster up Zeb Vance, we  
should think the people will be as-  
tonished to learn that the afore-  
said "Jimmy" was, during the war, vio-  
lently opposed to the "War Gov-  
ernor." In a speech made in  
Lexington in 1864, when Holden  
and Leach were candidates for Gov-  
ernor, Leach made the following  
reply in answer to a question from  
one Foster, who was his competitor  
for Congress:  
"I will tell Mr. Foster who I am  
not for, I am not for Vance for Gov-  
ernor, and never will support him  
unless he abandons his blood and  
thunder doctrine contained in his  
Wilkesboro speech."

Vance has never abandoned his  
blood and thunder doctrine, but  
Leach does support him. There is  
a lie out, will you believe it?  
LOOK OUT!  
A part of the Democratic plan for  
carrying North Carolina, will be to  
keep the colored laborers at work  
on the day of election by promising  
extra wages. We learn that this  
subject has been seriously discussed  
in the different Tilden and Vance  
clubs throughout the State. If nec-  
essary, some of Tilden's money will  
be distributed to aristocratic land  
owners to further their ends. In this

Our colored friends throughout  
the State must be on their guard  
against all such tricks. The loss of  
one day's work is a very small mat-  
ter in comparison with the loss of  
your personal liberties. Keep out  
of the spider's web, voters of North  
Carolina. If you once resign your  
rights as freemen, all is lost. Let  
no bribe or promise of reward deter  
you from doing your full duty to  
yourself and your country.

If the Democrats should succeed  
in carrying the State in Novem-  
ber, and should return a large ma-  
jority in the Legislature, the pre-  
odious Landlord and Tenant act will  
be so amended as to reduce the la-  
boring men of the country to com-  
plete slavery. In that event, a man  
who hires himself to work on the  
farm of a large land holder, will be  
in as bad condition as an apprentice.  
If he should be so unfortunate as to  
go in debt for provisions for himself  
and family, the land owner will be  
given the power to compel him to  
remain at work until the debt is  
paid. The only way to escape from  
such a system of servitude, is to vote  
solidly for the Republican ticket.

Do this, and the infamous Landlord  
and Tenant act will be repealed,  
and our working people freed from  
bondage.  
Vance would not have been  
elected in 1864 except through the  
instrumentality of the most out-  
rageous frauds and intimidation.  
He established a perfect system of  
espionage, and had his strikers and  
satraps at work to brow-beat Union  
men and watch their movements  
at the polls. He had yellow tickets  
printed, and every man was made  
to understand that unless he voted  
with the Vance party he would be  
conscripted and sent to the front.  
The same course pursued in 1864  
will be tried again at the coming  
election as far as possible. It is  
true that Vance has no power to  
send poor men to the army, but  
they will be conscripted with dis-  
charge from employment, and their  
families will be subjected to insult  
and perhaps outrage. The misera-  
ble bastards who, in many instances,  
compose the so-called Vance and  
Tilden clubs are already inaugu-  
rating this system of intimidation.  
Their plan, as betrayed by remarks  
on the streets and elsewhere, is to  
persuade as many as possible to  
yield to their line of political pol-  
icy, but failing in that, coercion will
