Under the act of 1871-72, chap. 185, it was made the duty of the county commissioners to appoint the Justices of the Peace of the various counties, registrars for the enrolling of voters in all counties of The following appointments have the State. But this did not satisfy been made and agreed upon between the Democratic majority in the Legislature of 1873-'74. In the election law of the session of 1873-'73. which was ratified on the 14th of February, 1874, and which can be found in the laws of that yearchap. 132, sec. 12-the provision requiring registrars to have magisterial powers was repealed, and the following proviso adopted in lieu thereof:-

"Provided, That any elector shall be eligible as registrar for their several townships in all such elections, [general elections] and any provision of chap. 185, laws of 1871-72, inconsistent with this proviso, is hereby repealed.
