Glorious News from the West!

A thoughtful friend, who is possessed of sound judgment, and who is not easily misled, sends us the most glorious news from the West. The fires which Jarvis did not see are blazing in all parts of the mountains. The country beyond the Ridge is all ablaze for Settle, Hayes and Victory. Even old Buncombe, the county in which Vance was born, will vote for Settle!

There will be a mammoth barbecue at Asheville, given by the Republicans, on the 20th of this month. TEN THOUSAND PEOPLE ARE EXPECTED TO BE PRESENT. Madison, Henderson, Buncombe, Haywood, Polk and other counties will be there in great force, and the Hayes and Settle Club of Bakersville, Mitchell county, NUMBERING SIX HUNDRED STRONG, will be present. This will not so much kindle the fires of Republicanism as it will bring them together into one great blaze, for they are burning already in every cove and on every mountain top. Many rousing cheers for our gallant Western friends!

Are you ready? What says the cotton? What says the Piedmont region? Are you ready? Do you hear the call our mountain friends make to you? Are you working as they are working? The Shoe Pinches.
Why does the shoe pinch? The answer is, that it has been provided that the Federal supervisors of election in this State shall not be subject to arrest on election day. Sen. Cox and others are greatly excited over this provision. They regard it as intolerable that a Federal officer, engaged in the most indispensable and pressing business, should not be liable to arrest for any cause for the space of one day. Well, now, here we see the cloven foot and the tiger's claw. How easy to trump up false charges against a supervisor, and then arrest him, and hold him all day, while Cox's honest party tools carry the elections by force or fraud. Would the man who sent that disreputable dispatch to Robeson, like to arrest these supervisors and detain them, in order to carry the elections as Robeson was carried, by the grossest frauds.

Suppos, for example, one of these supervisors (which is not probable), should commit murder on the day of election, could he make his escape? Would not a hundred eyes be upon him, and would not his arrest be as certain as the close of the day as on the day? No man who desires a fair or an honest election will want to arrest Federal supervisors, or to embarrass them in any way in the performance of their duties.

The shoe pinches, because the Democratic leaders are intent on fraud, and because these supervisors are in their way. When a thing plays into their hands, no matter how monstrous or mean that thing may be, it is at once as false a thing as ever was; but when the hand of justice and right and fair play is laid upon them, they quiver, and growl, and call it despotism, and indulge in foolish talk about magna chartas and habeas corpus. But no matter how much the shoe pinches, Mr. Manager Cox and his associates will have to wear it. The eye of an honest Government is on them, and that Government is determined to have justice and fair play in the elections.

Card from Hon. J. E. O'Hara.

The following card was sent to the News and publication refused in that paper:
RALEIGH, N. C., Oct. 20, 1876.

Editor Raleigh News:
I desire through your paper to correct one or two errors published in your issue of this date. First, you state the other day the Republican State Executive Committee met in this city, and advice of prominent Democratic gentlemen, who privately advised and urged me to remain upon the ticket and "maintain my manhood," yet in their public speeches used every effort in their power to stir up and keep alive all feeling and prejudice of caste against the negroes, thus proving conclusively to my mind, that it was their desire to use me as an instrument to accomplish their sinister political design, and aid them in carrying race against race in North Carolina. Should you, hereinafter, give me a moment's notice, I will give them at a moment's notice.

You claim that my "forced withdrawal is an insult to the colored voters of the State." I beg leave to ask, how long has the organ of the Democratic party been the champion of negro's honor? My experience for the past ten years has been that the Democratic papers and speakers are the discursive and political writers of the negro, simply because he dared to honestly maintain a different political faith, and you are mistaken if you believe, that at this peculiar juncture, we (the colored people) believe or rely upon anything but appointed and appointed champions of the colored race.
