PROCLAMATION,

By the Governor of North Carolina, 200 Dollars reward.

WHEREAS it has been made known to me that DANIEL MAY, late of the County of Anson, was at the last Spring Term of the Superior Court of said County, convicted of the crime of Negro stealing, and Judgment of Death pronounced against him, from which judgment an appeal was taken, and is now pending before the Supreme Court. And whereas it is represented that the said Daniel May, has escaped from Prison, is a fugitive from justice, and is believed to have fled beyond the limits of this State:

Now therefore, to the end that the said Daniel May, may be apprehended and brought to justice, I have thought proper to issue this Proclamation, offering a reward of Two Hundred Dollars to any person or persons who will apprehend and confine him in any Jail within this State. And I do moreover hereby require all Officers, whether civil or military, within this State, to use their best exertions to apprehend, or cause to be apprehended, the aforesaid fugitive.
