The bronze figure of Senator Vance, a tribute to the memory of North Carolina's greatest statesman and best loved citizen will be unveiled in the presence of thousands of patriotic Carolinians this afternoon at the west gate of the Capitol.

Unveiling of statue erected in honor of Zebulon Baird Vance in Capitol Square.

The procession will form in front of Metropolitan Hall, on Fayetteville street at 11:30 a. m., and move to the Capitol square in the following order:

RALEIGH MAN KILLED

Zell McAllister Shot in Newport News, Va.,

BALL AIMED AT ANOTHER

McAllister Attempted to Get Out of the Way, but Too Late to Escape the Bullet—Body to Be Brought Here Today for Burial—Tragedy Occurred in a Saloon in Newport News, Va., Yesterday Afternoon.

John W. McAllister of this city was fatally shot in Newport News, Va., yesterday.

The tragedy occurred in a saloon in that city, and the unfortunate party who fired the fatal shot made his escape.

It is that the bullet which killed McAllister was intended for another.

McAllister, or "Zell," as he was popularly known by his friends, was a member of Raleigh Typographical Union and was in the employ of the Newport News-Herald.

He left Raleigh several months ago, having worked as a linotype operator on the morning papers here.

The deceased was a native of Raleigh, being a son of the late John McAllister, who served as a member of the board of aldermen.

For some years he was in the employ of the Southern Express company, having a run as a messenger, a sister in Durham, Mrs. Joe (Kenny) another sister in Columbia, S. C., and numerous relatives in Raleigh were his nearest kin.

The remains will be brought here for interment. The body will arrive here this afternoon. The hour of the funeral will be announced later.

The following telegram to The Post News-Herald, Raleigh, Va., Aug. 21.—A pistol bullet, said to have been intended for another, ended the life of John W. McAllister late yesterday afternoon.

The shooting occurred in Begnall's & Rathskeller's saloon, and the proprietor who fired the fatal shot made his escape.

Accounts of the tragedy vary. The story told by an eye-witness is that a fellow named McCabe and Begnall quarreled. The former made a move as if to pull a pistol and McCabe attempted to move out of the way, but too late to escape the bullet fired by McCabe at his intended assailant.

The fatal ball entered the left breast, and McAllister sank to the floor without a murmur, bleeding to death before medical aid could arrive.

Begnall, seeing the result of his work, escaped and has not yet been apprehended.

The coroner's jury is now sitting on the case. Mr. McAllister, who was about thirty years of age, possessed a splendid physique. He was well liked here, and his friends were shocked with the news of his deplorable tragedy.

Verdict of the Coroner's Jury. Newport News, Va., Aug. 22.—The coroner's jury tonight returned a verdict to the effect that the deceased, John W. McAllister, came to his death from a pistol shot wound inflicted by William Bagnall. Bagnall later came back and gave himself up. The remains were taken charge of by the local union and will be sent to Raleigh this morning.

The shooting took place in a notorious section known as Bar Harbor, and there is reason to believe that the whole truth has not been brought to light.

Public opinion is thoroughly aroused and McCabe's death may be the means of ending Newport News of a hot-bed of vice.

A mass meeting of citizens will shortly be held to take some action. The fatal bullet pierced both lungs and death ensued almost instantly from internal hemorrhage.

All those present when the shooting took place were locked up. The preliminary trial will take place today.

Grand Army Men Sulk. Philadelphia, Aug. 21.—Because William J. Bryan is going to attend the National Encampment of the G. A. R. in Chicago, only three posts of thirty-five members of the grand army of the Republic are present in the city.
