### CORPORATION COMMISSION

#### Two or Three Railroads Liable to \$500 Fines

Mr. H. C. Brown, the efficient clerk of the North Carolina Corporation Commission, said yesterday that two or three of the railroad companies in the State have as yet failed to submit their annual reports up to June 1, as required by law. The commission is required by law to impose a fine of \$500 on every company failing to do so; and unless the reports are forthcoming very soon i fine will have to be imposed.

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
