Mt. Airy, N. C., Feb. 10. Correspondence of The Morning Post, Mr. Rufus Roberts, aged 72 years died at his home near Mt. Airy Satur-

Mr. Roberts was one of Surry coundone more to build up and develop our resources than any other man.
