# UNEVEN AND IRREGULAR Chamber of Commerce

## Dealings Were Small and the Range in Specialties Not as Wide as Yesterday

New York, March 20 .- Opening price changes of stocks today were very uneven and irregular. There were gains running to nearly a point in St. Paul, Metropolitan Street Railway and International Paper. Reading lost a large fraction. The dealings were small.

Price movements were conflicting, but the range in the specialties was not as wide as yesterday. Liberal selling affected General Electric, North American, Sugar, Metropolitan Street Railway, Reading common and second preferred, Delaware and Hudson, Northwestern, and Tennessee Coal to the extent of 1 to 3 points. Colorado Fuel, l'eople's Gas, and St. Paul made gains of 1 to 11 and Rock Island 21. Amalgamated Copper advanced a point before 11 o'clock.

Business decreased an dthe market was inclined to ease off, although there was hidding up of Amalgamated, Louisville and the Colorado Southern stocks. Rock Island lost a point. Sugar and the Readings were sold on rallies, and Colorado Fuel worked down to near vesterday's close. Net losses of 1 to 2 points were recorded in Consolidated Gas. Bonds were irregular.

Simultaneous bidding up of Colorado Fuel and North American, which put the former 4 points over yesterday's elise an dthe latter 41 above the lowest, caused a steadier tone to most stocks, but there were fresh selling in spats. Metropolitan Street Railway recovered to opening figures, and the railroads, while dull, were well held.

With the exception of a rally of over 2 in Sugar and a gain of a point in Manhattan, the notable movements were still restricted to less well-known stocks. Tennessee Coal rallied 1 to 1#. On the other hand Continental Tobacco preferred lost 2 points.

Brooklyn Transit rose a point on the authorization of the proposed bond istue by the stock holders today and Metropolitan advanced as much.

Northwestern preferred gained 3 and the common rallied a point. Colorado Finel touched 107, yesterday's high level. Profit-taking made general inroad upon prices of stocks that had advanced. The closing was quite active, but ir-
