

New Instructors for the A. & M. College

Elected by Board of Agriculture as College Trustees. To Ask Next Legislature for \$40,000

The North Carolina Board of Agriculture was in session yesterday at the A. & M. College as a board of trustees of that institution. They elected several new instructors and adopted a resolution to ask the next General Assembly for an appropriation of \$40,000 to be used for the better equipment of the agricultural department of the college.

LAWRENCE DAVIS ON TRIAL FOR MURDER

Charged with Offering \$100 and 1,000 Mile Ticket for Killing Mrs. Catherine Bailey

The preliminary investigation of the case against Lawrence Davis, charged with being an accessory to the murder of the late Mrs. Catherine Bailey near Parnell's, little more than a week ago, is now in progress before Judge Marston. The trial is in the county court room and is largely attended. It was remembered that Alonzo Morris was arrested for the murder and afterwards confessed the crime, claiming that Lawrence Davis told him if he would kill the woman he would give him \$100 and a thousand-mile ticket. Yesterday afternoon all testimony for the prosecution was heard and several witnesses for the defense were examined. Court took a recess until 10:30 o'clock this morning. The witnesses examined are Edgar Morris, P. R. Allen, J. S. White, Sid White, Henry Scott, W. J. Simpson and Dr. T. M. Jordan for the prosecution and A. S. Lyman, Lee Davis and Harry Morris for the defense.

JUDGMENT AND DECREE IN TYRRELL CASE

Judge Parnell on yesterday issued a judgment in the case of Person et al. receivers for Buffalo Banks, vs. Watson et al. in conformity with his opinion filed a few days ago, the judgment being for \$30,000 and a decree for the foreclosure of the mortgage and naming Thomas G. Skinner and Isaac McKnight as trustees to execute the order. The suit involved about 50,000 acres of land in Tyrrell county.
