## BRUISERS MEAN TO DO BUSINESS

Rumored That the Mayor Intended to Stop the Prize Fight.

San Francisco, July 21.—There were many rumors around town today that the Mayor would stop the prize fight. This report was due largely to the fact that the Mayor has not yet signed the ordinance granting the San Francisco Athletic Club permission to build a pavilion for the fight and will not consider it until Thursday night, which is only 24 hours before the fight. Even should he veto it the supervisors would pass the ordinance over his head. Mayor Schmitz was seen today. He said he had no intention of antagonizing the fight, but he proposed to present, and if he discovered anything showing a scheme to swindle the public with a fake he would interfere and prevent the fight. As every one knows this is a fight for blood it may be said that the Mayor will not interfere. Offices put in a good day at Oakland, running for an hour on the road, and then going to work. This afternoon he boxed eight rounds with Kennedy and his brother Jack, and made it warm for them both. Fitzsimmons took a good run this morning in Golden Gate park, and in the afternoon tried the gymnastic apparatus at the Olympic club and boxed with Hank Griffin and Soldier Wilson. Bob was feeling very good today, as his enthusiastic reception here yesterday put heart in him. He astonished every one at the Olympic club by his quickness, especially in boxing with Griffin, whose enormous reach makes him an ugly competitor.

## FARMING STATISTICS

Great Increase in the Industry in Ten Years

Washington, July 21.—Statistics on agriculture in the United States, announced by the census bureau today, show a large increase in this industry during the past ten years. The number of farms has increased more than 1,000,000, being now 5,739,057. The total acreage advanced from 623,000,000 in 1890 to 841,000,000 in 1900, and the total value of farm property from \$13,982,367,689 to \$20,514,901,885. The total value of farm products reported for 1890 was more than \$4,000,000,000, as compared with \$2,500,000,000 for 1880. The bureau states that the number of farms is now nearly four times what it was fifty years ago, while their value is more than five times as great.

## LET THE LAW TAKE ITS COURSE

Memphis, Tenn., July 21.—Governor Longino this afternoon decided to interfere in the case of Ashley G. Cooke, a member of a prominent Mississippi family, who is sentenced to be hanged at Greenville, Miss., tomorrow for the murder of Engineer Wray on a north-bound Illinois Central train last March. A delegation one hundred strong, headed by the aged mother of the doomed man, went to Jackson this morning to make a last appeal for Cooke. In the delegation were also a brother of the murderer, his sister, Mrs. Eugene Carrington of Memphis, a score of other relatives and a host of friends from all parts of the state. Every plea that could be thought of was made, but Governor Longino insisted that the law should take its course and that the hanging should occur at the time designated. Tom Lauderdale, an accomplice in the killing, is to be hanged at the same time. The execution has been ordered made public.

## No Hitch at Rome

Rome, July 21.—The Observator Roman, the organ of the Vatican, in denying that there is a hitch in the Philippine negotiations, recounts the states which were concluded by the American government accepting the lines of the Vatican's proposals, which will serve as the basis for future negotiations at Manila. The United States has notified the Vatican that in view of the complete entente between the government of the Philippines and the ecclesiastical authorities at Rome all danger of difficulty ought to be considered as having been eliminated. Monsignor Sbarretti, who will go to the Philippines, will be nominated apostolic delegate to Hays and Venemela.

## TELEGRAPH TERSITIES

Trenton, July 21.—The Tactico Cacao Sugar Company was incorporated today with a capital stock of \$2,000,000. The company is to operate in Cuba. Paris, July 21.—King Edward has contributed a further sum of \$3,000 to the fund for the relief of the sufferers by the eruption of Mount Pelee, Martinique. London, July 10.—Westminster will probably be without any public street decorations on the day of the king's coronation. A committee of the city council has decided to recommend that no more money be spent on decorations.

The old decorations have already been taken down. Philadelphia, July 21.—A strike was inaugurated today throughout the country by the United States Gold Beaters. The principal complaint of the strikers is the employment of women as gold fillers at the rate of eighteen cents, for which the gold beaters formerly received ninety cents.
