

# Lots of Clay Used in Greensboro Industries

## The Bar Takes Action in Regard to the Death of Judge Bynum - A Slick Swindling Scheme

Greensboro, N. C., Aug. 8.—Special.—At a meeting of the Greensboro bar this morning to take action expressed in regard to the death of Judge Bynum, James T. Morehead presided and Mr. A. B. Kimball acted as secretary. A committee composed of Maj. C. M. Steadman, Col. J. A. Barringer and Hon. Sam Bradshaw was chosen to report on the resolutions to the next term of court, and a resolution was adopted that the members attend the burial services in a body. A beautiful floral tribute was ordered for the funeral ceremonies. The meeting then adjourned until the coming session of the superior court.

An extensive business is done by the Potosi Terra Cotta Company in making and selling well tubing. It is found to be much the cheaper and better means of welling a well. The tubing is 24 inches in diameter, and after being cemented prevents anything from working into the well, as is the case with the best rock-walled or brick-lined well. Greensboro has ordered and thousands of feet from all over the country keeps the company busy day and night to keep up with orders.

A new candy manufactory has been opened up here by Mr. Charles Boyst, a former resident, but recently from Missouri. He will carry on a large wholesale and retail business, and has brought his family, who are cordially welcomed by their old friends here. Mr. Boyst is established at the improvement made in the ten years of his absence.

D. A. Kirkpatrick was this morning given the contract for making 700,000 bricks to be used in the construction of the new students' building at the State Normal and Industrial College, and has gone immediately to work making them. With this order, and the immense use of clay in making brick and tile, tubing, etc., added to the contract now out for the twenty millions of brick given out by the Cones for one cotton mill alone, if there were no other brick made at

all the hole made in Guilford county soil would be considered a regular Colorado canyon in some communities, but it cuts no figure here. Surrounding soil is graded down, the whole evened up, sold for a town lot if in the city, or devoted to raising wheat, cabbages, fruit or something of the kind in the country. Another car-casser was arrested last night and, according to Mayor Osborn's upward sliding scale of fines, is due to pay \$27.50 fine and costs when his case is settled.

Chief of Police Scott has on his list the names of 204 delinquent dog owners. Unless the dollar for each is forthcoming by next Monday he is going to catch said delinquent owner instead of the dog.

Solicitor A. L. Brooks has returned from Hillsboro, where he attended Orange court. The most interesting matter, he said, which came to the attention of the grand jury was a charge of swindling brought against J. A. Andrews, engineer of the Enno Cotton Mill. It was stated that Andrews' swindling game was on the following plan: He would issue wood tickets in exchange for wood, giving tickets to cover twice or three times the amount of the wood brought. When the party who brought the wood cashed his tickets at the office of the secretary and treasurer he would, it is supposed, go to the engineer and divide with him. Andrews himself got away, but the grand jury returned a true bill for forgery against him. Two of the parties who co-operated with him were convicted and sentenced to terms on the roads. It is estimated that the company lost fully a thousand dollars as a result of these swindling operations.

A distinguished quartet was here at noon, all from Winston, viz.: Col. Garland Webb, H. E. Fries, W. M. Reynolds and E. P. Albee. They were going to the four points of the compass.

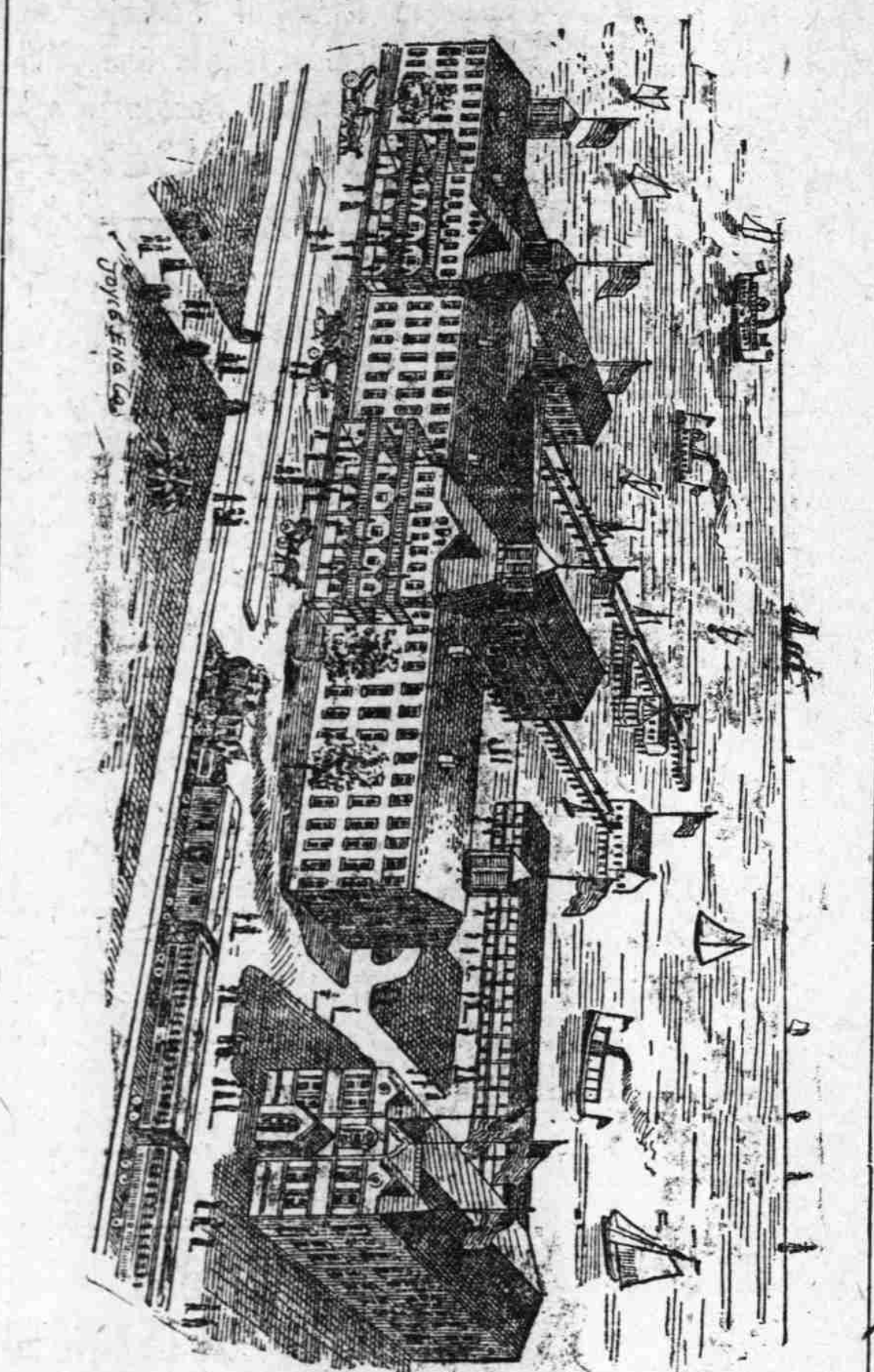
Superintendent of Public Instruction Joerner made an educational speech at Asheboro yesterday, spent the night with his family here, and went to Graham to deliver an address today.

# Aldermen of Goldsboro Deliberate on Tax Levy

## A Bank Cashier Will Retire - A Boy Loses a Thumb. Tobacco Board of Trade Elects Committees

Goldsboro, N. C., Aug. 8.—Special.—The resignation of Mr. J. M. Hollowell as cashier of the National Bank of this city will take effect on the 20th of this month and has caused no little surprise on the part of the many patrons of the bank and his numerous friends. This reporter called at the bank this morning to ascertain his reason for resigning and he said:

"I am forced to take this step on account of failing sight. I have been working regularly without a vacation for the past four years and I feel that I need rest."

His successor has not been elected so far and nothing could be learned from the bank officials as to who would be selected to fill the place. The resignation of Mr. Hollowell has not been announced before and on this account there have been no applications for the position.

Young Daily Edgerton of Warenton stopped over in the city yesterday with his grandfather, Rev. J. T. Daily, of Fremont, to visit Mr. I. F. Osmond and family. During the afternoon the boy, while at play with some children in the yard got his right thumb caught in the spokes of a bicycle and had that member cut off and it fell to the ground. The accident caused much pain but is not serious.

At the regular monthly meeting of the board of aldermen last night a proposition to purchase additional property to enlarge the cemetery and provide a lodge for the sexton and a chapel was referred to the cemetery committee. Alderman Sol Weil, for the finance committee, reported that the committee had fixed the tax levy at 30 cents on property and 90 cents on the poll. The salaries of the board of public works were fixed at \$200 for the chairman of the board, and \$150 for each of the other two members of the board. Alderman Royall opposed the rate of tax levy and moved to make it 20 and 60 cents, respectively. The motion was lost, but the board decided to postpone consideration of the question until the finances of the city shall have been more fully investigated.

An ordinance was introduced making it a fine of fifty dollars for any person to erect any ivery or sale stables within 60 feet of any residence. It was referred to the ordinance committee.

The Tobacco Board of Trade met last night and elected the following committee for the ensuing season: Executive—J. H. Bennett, S. W. Draper, S. G. Williams. Arbitration—J. L. Faulkner, Geo. S. Pritchard, J. E. Jones. Sales—Robert Hairston, R. C. Fraeman, T. N. Waters, A. W. Scott, W. P. Eakes. After discussing the outlook for the Goldsboro market the board adjourned to meet subject to the call of the president.

The city of Goldsboro has received from the North Carolina corporation

commission the following valuation of railroad and telegraph property upon which to levy taxes for the ensuing year. W & W. R. Co., \$52,600.79; A. & N. C. R. R. Co., \$20,638.54; North Carolina R. R. Co., \$14,559.52; Western Union Telegraph Co., \$1,019.37.

Vanlandingham was farming with Mr. Dortch and the latter sent him to settle some trouble with the negro. Vanlandingham said that he shot in self-defense, as the negro was drawing a pistol on him. There has not been any inquest held yet.
