Carr of Wilmington is spending a day or two here witnessing the organization of the Legislature. Sheel Fish Commissioner W. M. Webb of Beaufort is in the city preparing his annual report for the Governor. Mr. John Giles of Wilmington passed through the city yesterday on his way to Chapel Hill to resume his studies in the State University. Mr. Geo. P. Pell is here from Jefferson. He came to attend a meeting of the board of directors of the North Carolina Railroad of which he is a member. The state superintendent of public instruction sent a check yesterday to the state colored normal school at Winston-Salem for \$400. It is from the Peabody fund. Sheriff J. K. Cline of Lincoln county was in the city yesterday and settled state taxes for 1932. The amount was \$4,400. He also brought a negro convict to the State's prison. Mr. O. Knox Gardner arrived yesterday from Shelby to resume his studies at the A. and M. College, being a member of the senior class. He will be manager of the base ball team for the spring of 1933. The National Museum at Washington helps with funds to support the explorations in Egypt which Dr. Flinders Petrie, the great Egyptologist, is making. As its share of this year's finds it has just received 10 papyrus manuscripts, dating from about the birth of Christ. They are most bills of lading for camel trains, receipts for goods, etc. Hawaiian fuel has heretofore been coal from Australia chiefly. Within a year this will be entirely superseded with fuel from California, with a saving 35 to 60 per cent. in cost. Contracts have already been signed for the delivery of 750,000 barrels of the fuel oil per annum to Hawaii, and within a year the consumption will be 1,000,000 barrels per annum. Silas W. Bond of Iowa Falls, has cast his ballot for presidential candidates—a record held by comparatively few men. Mr. Bond's first vote was in Wayne county, Ind., when he voted for Henry Clay.
