Shakespeare Club

The Shakespeare Club of the University of North Carolina has just held a notable meeting. A very large audience took advantage of the open invitation and the attractive program. The president, Dr. Thomas Hume, in a brief address showed that one distinctive feature of the club was that it dealt with subjects that touch the universal life of man and one of general and unending interest. "Romeo and Juliet as a Lyrical Tragedy," Mr. Fred Archer's paper, was a fine critical study, presented in felicitous style, of the rhythmic forms like sonnets, sextets, concertos and antitheses and of the elaborate symmetry of the play. Mr. H. R. McFadyen, the efficient secretary of the club, read a happily conceived paper on "Romeo and Juliet, Comedy or Tragedy," in which he compared the failure of the Spanish Lope to make a true comedy out of the subject with Shakespeare's wonderful tragedy of love and youth and death. The special feature of the evening was the lecture by Dr. Smith on "The Shakespeare-Bacon Question," a most instructive and entertaining discussion, which covered Miss Delia Bacon's eccentric introduction of Lord Bacon as the author of the plays, Ignatius Donnelly's absurd cryptogram, the evidence of Shakespeare's contemporaries and the general question of Shakespeare's capacity to produce such dramas. The large audience was deeply interested and gratified. Its many old alumni members will be glad to hear that the club is a live thing, though seventeen years old.  
 The Philological Club has taken on new life. Dr. Hume is president and Professor Toy secretary. It has good work laid out.
