## EXTENSION OF THE RALEIGH & CAPE FEAR

First Mortgage for \$310,000 to Complete Road to Fayetteville

A first mortgage of \$310,000 by the Raleigh and Cape Fear Railroad to the Knickerbocker Trust Company of New York was filed for record yesterday in the office of the Wake county register of deeds, the specific purpose of the money derived from the mortgage being to extend the road to Lillington, and thence through Harnett and Cumberland counties to Fayetteville and provide rolling stock for the road. Under the provisions of the mortgage 40 year 5 per cent gold bonds will be issued. The mortgage of \$310,000 is specified to be equal to \$5,000 per mile of the completed road and the improvements are to include a bridge across the Cape Fear near Lillington. The mortgage is to be dated February 28, 1903.
