VETERANS' ENCAMPMENT

Posters Put up at Every Post-office in Wake County

Capt. J. J. Thomas, president of the Wake county confederate veterans' association, and Mr. A. B. Stronach, commander of the L. O. B. Branch camp, are having the following notice posted at every post office in Wake county: "The annual encampment of the confederate veterans of North Carolina will be held in the city of Raleigh during fair week. Encampment begins Tuesday evening, October 20th, and ends Thursday morning, October 23rd. Camp will be pitched in Cameron field between the city and fair grounds. Tents, straw for bedding, ice water, bread and coffee will be furnished free to veterans. All other provisions, bed clothes, etc., will have to be furnished by the veterans themselves. On Wednesday the veterans will march in a body to the fair grounds where they will be admitted free of charge. Wednesday evening the ladies' memorial association, daughters of confederacy, ladies' auxiliary, corps of L. O. B. Branch camp, and the ladies generally of the city of Raleigh will give the veterans a complimentary dinner."
