

Weather Conditions

An area of high pressure central yesterday over the east-central part of the country has remained stationary. The pressure from the Mississippi river to the Pacific has fallen. There is an area of depression over the Texas coast and also one of considerable intensity central over Utah. The temperature has risen in the northern portion of the country from the Atlantic coast to Montana, Idaho and Utah, and has fallen from these states westward. The highest maximum was 98 degrees at Phoenix. Partly cloudy and cloudy conditions prevail, and rain has fallen in the northwest and southwest portions of the country. A thunderstorm occurred at North Platte. 2.64 inches of rain fell at New Orleans during the past twenty-four hours.

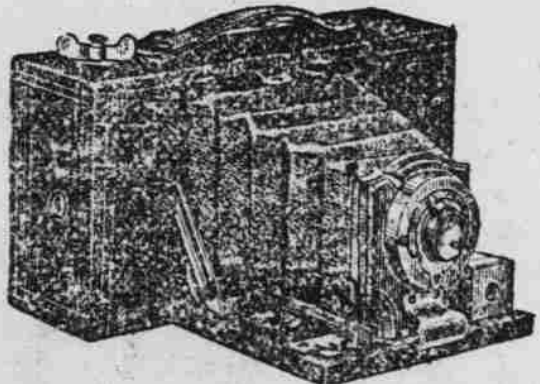

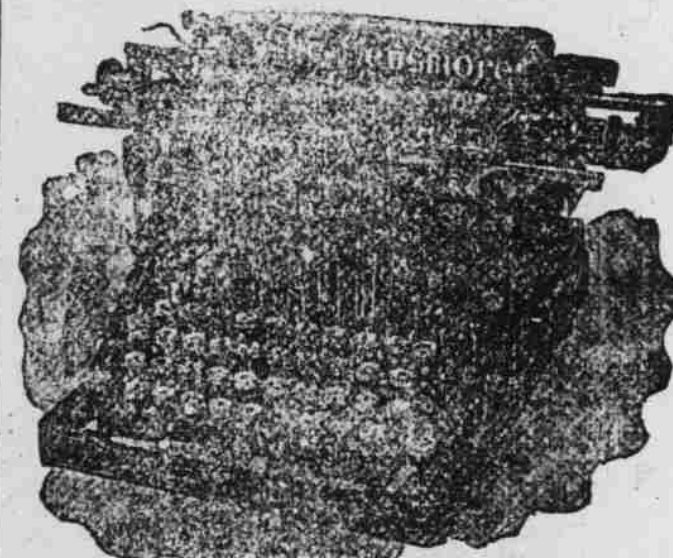
